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
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
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
### 1. GENERAL INFORMATION

#### 1.1. DIMENSIONS






#### 1.2. CONNECTORS






- 1 Ethernet RJ45 connector

#### CAUTION!

"Balance-Ethernet" cable is a standard cable terminated with RJ45 connector on both ends.



#### 1.3. INTENDED USE

3Y series balances are intended for precise mass measurement under laboratory conditions.

#### 1.4. PRECAUTIONS

- Prior the first use, it is highly recommended to carefully read this User Manual, and operate the balance as intended.
- Do not operate the touch panel using sharp-edged tools (knife, screwdriver, etc.).
- While loading the balance make sure that loads are placed in the very center of the weighing pan.
- Load the weighing pan with loads, gross weight of which does not exceed instrument's measuring range (maximum capacity).
- Do not leave heavy loads on the weighing pan for a longer period of time.
- In case of failure, immediately unplug the instrument from the mains.
- Balances to be decommissioned, have to be decommissioned in accordance with valid legal regulations.
- Do not use the balance is areas endangered with explosion. The X2 series is not designed to operate in EX zones.

#### 1.5. WARRANTY CONDITIONS

- A. RADWAG feels obliged to repair or exchange all elements that appear to be faulty by production or by construction,
- B. Defining defects of unclear origin and means of their elimination can only be realized with assistance of manufacturer and user representatives,
- C. RADWAG does not bear any responsibility for defects or losses resulting from unauthorized or inadequate performing of production or service processes,
- D. Warranty does not cover:
  - mechanical defects caused by product exploitation other than intended, defects of thermal and chemical origin, defects caused by lightning, overvoltage in the power network or other random event.
  - balance defects if it is utilized contrary to its intended use,
  - balance defects, if service claims removing or destroying protective stickers which secure the balance's housing against unauthorized access,
  - mechanical defects or defects caused by liquids and natural wear,
  - balance defects caused by inappropriate setting or by electrical wiring failures.
  - defects caused by overloading the mechanical measuring system,
  - maintenance activities (cleaning).

#### E. Loss of warranty takes place if:

- a repair is carried out outside RADWAG sales office or authorized service point,

#### 1.6. METROLOGICAL PARAMETERS MONITORING

Metrological characteristics of the balance require periodical inspection to be carried out by its user. Inspection frequency is dependent on ambient conditions in which the balance is used, types of performed processes and accepted quality management system in organization.

#### 1.7. USER MANUAL SIGNIFICANCE

It is very important to read the user manual carefully before switching on and starting up balance operation, even if you are experienced and have worked with this type of balance before.

#### 1.8. BALANCE USER TRAINING

The balance has to be utilized and supervised only by users who are trained and experienced in using such type of weighing instruments.

#### 2. TRANSPORT AND STORAGE

#### 2.1. DELIVERY CHECKLIST

Upon delivery it is necessary to check the package and the device, make sure that your package bears no signs of damage. If it does contact the manufacturer's representative.

#### 2.2. PACKAGE

Keep all package elements should your balance be transported in the future. Remember that only original packaging can be used for shipping purposes. Prior packing uncouple any cables, remove any separable components (weighing pan, shields, inserts). Pack the device components into an original packaging. The original packaging protects the equipment against potential damage during transportation.

#### 3. UNPACKING AND INSTALLATION

#### 3.1. PLACE OF USE AND ASSEMBLING

- The balance has to be stored and used in locations free of vibrations and shakes, free of air movement and dust.
- Ambient air temperature cannot exceed the range of: +10 °C ÷ +40 °C.
- Ambient relative humidity cannot exceed 80%.
- During balance operation, ambient temperature in the weighing room cannot change rapidly.
- The balance has to be located on a stable wall console desk or a stable working table which is not affected by vibrations and distant from heat sources.
- Take special precaution when weighing magnetic objects, as part of the balance is a strong magnet. Should such loads be weighed, use under-pan weighing option, which removes the weighed load from area influenced by the balance's magnet. The hook for under-pan weighing is installed in balance's base.


#### 3.2. UNPACKING

Cut the adhesive tape. Take the device out of the packaging. Open the accessory box, take the device components out of it.

A – balance with d=0.01mg interval


B – balance with d=0.1mg interval

Remove a transport lock (1) – gently press the transport lock and turn it accordingly to <OPEN> instruction, keep the transport lock should your balance be transported in the future.

Install components following the above diagram:

- bottom insert (5),
- centring ring [embossment side up]
   (4).
- weighing pan (2),
- anti-draft chamber (3) or (1).

Remove tape protecting the grounding spring, located on one of the rubber pan receivers (1). Install components following the above diagram:

- pan receivers (1),
- weighing pan (2),

glass anti-draft chamber (3).

#### 3.4. MAINTENANCE ACTIVITIES

#### CAUTION!

Cleaning anti-draft chamber while still installed may cause damage of the measuring system.

- 1. Disassembly a weighing pan and other detachable components (the components differ depending on a balance type see *Unpacking and Installation* section). Be careful while detaching the components so as not to cause any damages to the balance mechanism.
- 2. You can disassembly anti-draft chamber panes of series is order to clean them properly for disassembly instruction read below.

#### Cleaning ABS components:

To clean dry surfaces and avoid smutching use clean non-colouring cloths made of cellulose or cotton. You can use a solution of water and detergent (soap, dishwashing detergent, glass cleaner). Gently rub the cleaned surface and let it dry. Repeat cleaning process if needed.

In the case when contamination is hard to remove, e.g. adhesive, rubber, resin, polyurethane foam residues etc., you can use a special cleaning agents based on a mixture of aliphatic hydrocarbons that do not dissolve plastics. Before using the cleanser for all surfaces we recommend carrying out tests. Do not use products containing abrasive substances.

#### Cleaning anti-draft chamber panes:

Select dissolvent depending on a dirt. Never soak the glass panes in alkaline solutions since they interact with glass and may cause damage. Do not use abrasive substances.

For organic dirt use acetone first, next use water or detergent. For other than organic dirt use diluted acid solutions (soluble salts of hydrochloric or nitric acid) or base solutions (ammonium or sodium base).

To remove ACIDS use protofilic solvent (sodium carbonate), to remove BASE use protogenic solvent (mineral acid of various concentration).

In case of heavy contamination use brush or detergent nevertheless avoid detergents containing large and hard molecules which could potentially scratch glass panes.

Use soft brush with wooden or plastic handle exclusively to avaoid risk of scratches. Do not use wire brush.

At the end of the cleaning process rinse the pane using running water first, distilled next.

Rinsing is a necessary cleaning process stage allowing to remove remaining soap, detergents and other cleansers from the panes prior their reinstallation.

Avoid drying the panes either using paper towel or forced air circulation since some fibres, grains or contamination of other type could permeate into the panes thus causing weighing errors.

One shall not use driers when drying measuring glass tools.

It is a frequent treatment to leave glass components on a rack to dry.

#### Cleaning stainless steel components:

Avoid using cleansers containing any corrosive chemicals, e.g. bleach (containing chlorine). Do not use abrasive substances. Always remove the dirt using microfiber cloth to avoid damage of protective coating.

In case of a daily maintenance:

- 1. Remove the dirt using cloth dipped in warm water.
- 2. For best results, add a little dishwashing detergent.

#### Cleaning powder-coated components:

For preliminary cleaning stage you need running water or wet sponge featuring large holes, this will help you to remove loose, heavy dirt.

Do not use cleansers containing abrasive substances.

Next using cloth and cleanser-water solution (soap, dishwashing liquid) gently rub the cleaned surface.


Avoid using cleanser without water since it may result with damage of the cleaned surface, please mind that large amount of water mixed with cleanser is a must.


#### Cleaning aluminium components:

While cleaning aluminium components use products acid by nature, e.g. spirit vinegar, lemon. Do not use abrasive substances. Avoid using hard brush, this may cause scratches. It is recommended to use microfibre cloth.

While polishing the surface use circular movements. Use clean, dry cloth.

#### AS 3Y series - order of actions:





Thus prepared anti-draft chamber and panes can be properly cleaned. All the operations have to be done carefully. Pay special attention to the spot where the weighing pan is installed: dirt and other small elements might enter the balance construction through this opening, which might negatively influence the balance parameters.

Upon completion of the cleaning process assembly the balance, take actions like before but in a reverse order. Pay a special attention to the left and the right side pane, assembly it on the correct side of the balance. While sliding the pane back onto its place remember to pull the protection (like before when dismantling the anti-draft chamber).

#### 3.5. POWERING THE DEVICE

The balance has to be plugged to the mains using the original power adapter exclusively. Plug the power adapter's to the power supply socket located at the back of the housing.

#### 3.6. TEMPERATURE STABILIZATION

Before measurement it is necessary to wait until the balance reaches thermal stabilisation.

For balances that were stored in much lower temperatures before plugging to the mains, thermal stabilisation period shall take at least 4 hours for PS balances, and 8 hours for AS balances. During the thermal stabilization, the indications on a display panel can change. It is recommended that ambient temperature changes at place of use were insignificant (slow to change).

#### 3.7. CONNECTING PERIPHERAL EQUIPMENT

Use only accessories and peripheral equipment recommended by the manufacturer. The balance must be unplugged before connecting or disconnecting any peripherals (printer, PC computer, computer keyboard). On connecting the peripherals, plug the balance to the mains.

#### 3.8. BALANCES FEATURING TERMINAL-WEIGHING MODULE WIRELESS CONNECTION

(an option)



The terminal operates on batteries, wireless connection ensures its cooperation with the weighing module. This, in contrast to a standard design, allows to eliminate cable connecting the devices. Wireless connection solution is marked by letter **<B>**, e.g. **AS 220.3Y.B**.

#### Features:

Maximum range: 10 m

Maximum operation time of the terminal (without the necessity to charge batteries): 8 h

#### Advantages:

#### 1. Lack of additional sources of vibration

Terminal located elsewhere than the weighing table eliminates vibrations being a result of operation. This ensures stable working conditions for balances with the highest resolution. No specific weighing workstations are needed.

#### 2. Comfort of weighing in fume cupboards and laminar flow cabinets

Wireless connection between a terminal and a weighing module positively influences weighing process making it more comfortable and safer.

#### 3. Elimination of unfavourable influence factors

Due to wireless connection the weighing module may be completely separated from the operator by being placed in an anti-draft chamber. This makes weighing of contaminated and toxic substances possible without putting one's health and life to risk.

#### 4. Improved pipetting ergonomics


Pipettes calibration process requires precision and quickness of operation. Wireless connection redefines comfort of operation and quarantees high measurement accuracy.

Wireless solutions are equipped with 2 power suppliers. One used for supplying the weighing module, the other for powering the terminal.

#### 3.8.1. Start-up Procedure

On unpacking and placing the balance onto its workstation it is necessary to connect the weighing module and the terminal to the mains. Next proceed like in case of a standard design (description to be found further down this user manual).

Home screen for wireless connection solution:



Home screen for wireless connection solution features two extra pictograms when compared to a standard design:

- 1. battery charge status pictogram
- 2. wireless connection pictogram

Operation and functions are identical like for standard design balances.

#### 3.8.2. Pictograms Description

Battery charge status pictogram:

No.	Pictogram	Description
1		Battery charging
2		Battery charged, terminal connected to the mains
3		Battery charged, terminal not connected to the mains
4		Battery status (about 50%), terminal not connected to the mains
5		Low battery status, necessity of connecting the terminal to the mains

Wireless connection pictogram:

No.	Pictogram	Description
1		Correct connection of wireless modules – correct cooperation
2		Connection interrupted – loss of connection

#### 3.8.3. Settings


In order to provide long enough operation while powering the device by means of battery, the correct parameters of group Miscellaneous must be set, <Sleep mode> <Display brightness>. For detailed information go to section 34 of this user manual: *Miscellaneous*.

#### 4. START-UP

- 1. On plugging the balance to the mains, instrument's diode ON/LOAD ON/LOAD ON/LOAD located on indicator's housing is lit up.
- 2. Press power key located on the left. Within a few seconds the OS Windows and RADWAG software start loading, it is signaled by flickering red diode ON/LOAD.
- 3. On completing the startup procedure, the main window of the balance software is displayed.
- 4. The balance starts up with no user logged in. In order to start operation it is necessary to log in. (logging procedure description to be found further down this user manual).

CAUTION! Remember to start the balance when unloaded.

#### 5. KEYBOARD - BUTTONS' FUNCTIONS




#### 6. SOFTWARE STRUCTURE

The main menu has been divided into function groups. Each group comprises parameters grouped by their reference. For detailed description of each menu group read later sections of this user manual.

#### **List of groups - Parameters**

Balance's main menu is accessed by pressing SETUP function key or button located in the bottom tool bar of balance's display. The menu comprises parameters referring to balance settings, functions and profiles.



#### 7. WEIGHING MODE HOME SCREEN



#### The main window of balance software can be divided into 4 sections:


 Top section displaying data on active working mode, logged operator, date, time, active connection to a computer and current level status of a balance.



Section presenting the weighing result and a current measuring unit.



Grey workspace containing additional data on currently carried out activities.



CAUTION!

Data contained in the workspace is freely configurable. For detailed information on data configuration refer to section 14.4 of this user manual.

Workspace with set of soft keys:



You can define the on-screen function buttons. For detailed instruction go to section 14.3 of this user manual.

#### 8. LOGGING

Full access to user parameters and to editing databases requires logging as an operator with **<Administrator>** permissions level. Carry out logging procedure on each switching on of the balance.

#### First Log In operation - procedure:

- 1. Run home screen and press **Log in>** button, operators database window opens with list of available users and **Admin>** entry.
- 2. Select < Admin> parameter, the software activates an on-screen keyboard, use it to enter operator's password: "1111".
- 3. Press button to confirm.
- 4. Home screen of the software is displayed again automatically, **<Log in>** sign is replaced with **<Admin>** sign.
- 5. When logged, add users and set the permissions levels (for the procedure of assigning permissions levels read section 11 and 12).

On future Logging In, select a user from the list and enter the password, the software initiates operation with permissions level set for the selected user.


#### Log out operation – procedure:

- 1. Run home screen and press logged user name, operators database window opens.
- 2. Press <Log out> button (position no. 1 of the list of operators).
- 3. Home screen of the software is displayed again automatically, **<Admin>** sign is replaced with **<Log in>** sign.

#### 9. OPERATING BALANCE MENU

Operation of balance software menu is intuitive and uncomplicated. The touch panel makes the software operation easy. Pressing a function key, a soft key or an area on the display initiates an assigned function or process.

#### 9.1. SOFT KEYS LIST



#### 9.2. RETURN TO WEIGHING MODE

Introduced modifications are automatically saved to menu on return to the weighing mode.

#### Procedure:

- 1. Press soft key repeatedly, keep pressing the key until the balance home screen is displayed.
- 2. Press soft key located on the balance overlay for immediate display of a home screen.

#### 10. ADJUSTMENT

3Y series balances feature automatic internal adjustment system which ensures correct measurement accuracy. Menu <ADJUSTMENT> contains functions controlling operation of balance adjustment process.

#### 10.1. INTERNAL ADJUSTMENT

Internal adjustment is carried out by means of an internal adjustment weight. <Internal adjustment> button, when pressed, automatically triggers adjustment process. Upon adjustment process completion respective message, informing about process end and about its status, is displayed.

#### CAUTION!

Adjustment procedure requires stable environmental conditions (no air drafts or ground vibrations). The process must be carried out with an empty weighing pan.

#### **10.2. EXTERNAL ADJUSTMENT**

External adjustment is carried out by means of an external mass standard of specified accuracy class and weight. Both, accuracy class and mass standard weight depend on balance type and mas capacity. The process takes semi-automatic form, successive stages are signalled with prompts.

#### CAUTION!

External adjustment is possible for balances that are not a subject to conformity assessment (verification).

#### Procedure:

- 1. Enter <Adjustment> submenu, next select " External adjustment" parameter.
- 2. "Remove weight" prompt is displayed.
- 3. Take the weight off the weighing pan and press button. Whereas balance determines start mass, "Start mass determination" message is displayed.
- 4. Upon completed start mass determination procedure "Put weight ..." prompt is displayed along with particular mass standard value.
- 5. Put the required weigh on a pan and press button.
- 6. Upon completed procedure "Remove weight" prompt is displayed.
- 7. Take the weight off the weighing pan, press button, the balance proceeds to the weighing mode.

#### 10.3. USER ADJUSTMENT

User adjustment is carried out with an optional standard of mass ranging between 0.15 Max and Max. User adjustment and external adjustment procedures are likewise with one exception, before user adjustment start a message box for entering mass of a standard used for user adjustment is opened.

#### CAUTION!

User adjustment is possible for balances that are not a subject to conformity assessment (verification).

In order to start user adjustment, enter <Adjustment> submenu and select User adjustment' parameter. Then follow the prompts displayed on a screen.

#### 10.4. ADJUSTMENT TEST

<Adjustment test> function enables comparing the result of an internal automatic adjustment with the value recorded in balance factory parameters. The comparison is used for determining balance sensitivity drift over time.

#### 10.5. AUTOMATIC ADJUSTMENT

This menu is for declaring a value initiating an automatic adjustment. Accessible options:

- None automatic adjustment disabled,
- Time adjustment takes place in time intervals declared in menu <Automatic adjustment time>
   (10.6),
- Temperature adjustment is triggered by temperature change only,
- Both adjustment is triggered by both, temperature changes and time.

#### CAUTION!

Parameter settings can be modified only for balances that are not a subject to conformity assessment (verification).

#### 10.6. AUTOMATIC ADJUSTMENT TIME

Automatic adjustment time> parameter determines time interval between successive internal adjustments carried out automatically. The time interval is declared in hours and ranges between 1 and 12 hours.

To set time interval for automatic adjustment:

- select < Automatic adjustment time > parameter,
- using displayed menu, select appropriate time interval (given in hours) which is a time gap elapsing from the last carried out internal automatic adjustment until activation of the following automatic internal adjustment.

#### CAUTION!

Parameter settings can be modified only for balances that are not a subject to conformity assessment (verification).

#### 10.7. SCHEDULED BALANCE ADJUSTMENT

Scheduled adjustments> parameter allows you to specify precisely time for adjustment performance and interval between successive adjustments. The parameter is independent from automatic adjustment and criteria that trigger it (time, temperature). You can plan when internal and external adjustment shall be performed. In order to design schedule for external adjustment, it is necessary to record into balance memory mass standards for adjustment performance.

#### Parameter values:

1. Enter data of mass standards intended for external adjustment performance.

2. Enter user menu, select <Adjustment> parameter group and find < Mass standards> parameter, enter necessary data:






Enter user menu, select <Adjustment> parameter group and find <Scheduled adjustments> parameter.

Enter <Scheduled adjustments> parameter, wait for 'Scheduled adjustments' window to open, add adjustment procedures. Remember, only Administrator can add new positions.

In order to add a new position, click button, wait for a window with data on planned balance adjustment to open.

Select task: automatic adjustment (internal) or external adjustment.

For automatic adjustment option, enter data on the adjustment and its schedule.



For external adjustment option, enter data on the adjustment, mass standard used for the adjustment performance and its schedule.

When all necessary data has been introduced, go back to the previous window. The window features newly added position relating to planned balance adjustment procedure.

Upon entering all data exit the menu.

Now all the adjustments are carried out automatically as planned and with specified time intervals.

#### **10.8. REPORT PRINTOUT**

Parameter < Report printout > determines whether or not a report on automatic internal adjustment is to be automatically printed on its completion.

In order to set automatic report printout on adjustment completion go to parameter: < Report printout > and select value <YES>.

#### 10.9. GLP PROJECT

GLP is one of many methods for documenting work in accordance with adopted quality system. Data selected for printing is printed on each release of a report on balance adjustment.

Information and signs to be used in a GLP report:

- adjustment (adjustment mode)
- working mode (working mode name)
- date, time,
- user,
- balance type,
- balance ID,
- level status.
- nominal mass,
- current mass
- difference
- temperature,
- blank line,
- dashes,
- signature,
- non-standard printout.

#### 10.10. ADJUSTMENT HISTORY

Adjustment history contains data on all carried out adjustment processes. The record is carried out automatically. Each entry on adjustment comprises basic data on completed process. Balance menu enables displaying the list of completed adjustment processes, and each report is printable.

In order to print a report on adjustment process, enter <Adjustment> submenu, next enter <Adjustment history>, select adjustment to be printed. On displaying details of a record, press < > > print key on display's top bar.

#### CAUTION!

If the balance memory is full then the oldest record gets automatically deleted.

If internal procedures of an organization require maintaining complete documentation from all carried out adjustment processes, then the list with records on adjustment has to be periodically printed and filed.

#### Searching for adjustment record

Balance enables searching for a specific record from completed adjustment processes:

Press search icon and insert date of adjustment process.

#### Exporting data on completed adjustment process

Connect a USB flash drive to balance's USB port. Press <Data export> button located in the top right corner of balance's display. The process is fully automatic, and on its completion, a file with extension \*.tdb is saved on a USB flash drive connected to the USB port. The file can be edited using Excel spreadsheet or a text editor.

#### 11. USERS

"Users" menu contains list of operators, who are authorized to operate the instrument.

The following data can be defined for each balance user:

- Name
- Code
- Password
- Access level
- Language
- Profile
- Card no.

**New user** can be added by the Administrator exclusively.

#### Procedure:

- 1. Enter Users menu, press <Add> \bigcup \text{key,}
- 2. Define all necessary fields.

#### CAUTION!

It is posible to search for a user in a database of users by code or name.

#### Edit data on a user:

#### Procedure:

- 1. Press field with name of a user.
- 2. The display indicates data on a specific user.
- 3. Select and change necessary data.


**New user** can be deleted by the Administrator exclusively.

#### Procedure:

1. Press and hold user name.

- 2. Menu referring to a user record is displayed.
- 3. Select < Delete > parameter.





#### 12. PERMISSIONS LEVELS

Access levels specify which operations are enabled/disabled for a particular user. This menu can be modified by the Administrator exclusively.

#### **Anonymous user**

The Administrator can grant access level to a balance user who is not logged in (Anonymous user).

#### Procedure:

- 1. Enter < Access level> menu.
- 2. Select < Anonymous user> parameter.
- 3. Set appropriate access level for the anonymous user. Available access levels for an anonymous user: Guest, User, Advanced User, Administrator.

#### CAUTION!

Selecting <Guest> access level for not logged in user prevents him/her from modifying any balance settings.

#### Date and time

Default settings enable a user logged as the **Administrator** to modify date and time settings. The software enables changing access level for < Date and time > parameter.

#### Procedure:

- 1. Enter < Access level> menu.
- 2. Select < Date and time> parameter.
- 3. Set desired access level required to modify the settings. Available access levels for changing date and time settings are: Guest, User, Advanced User, Administrator.

#### CAUTION!

Selecting **<Guest>** access level provides free access to date and time settings (no need to log in).

#### **Printouts**

Default settings enable a user logged as the **Administrator** to edit default printout templates. The software enables changing access level for < Printouts> parameter.

#### **Procedure:**

- 1. Enter < Access level> menu.
- 2. Select < Printouts> parameter and select one of available parameters: Guest, User, Advanced User, Administrator.

#### CAUTION!

Selecting **<Guest>** access level provides free access to printouts settings (no need to log in).

#### Printout/Value Release

Default settings enable a user logged as the **User** to edit default printout templates. The software enables changing access level for < Value Release> parameter.

#### Procedure:


- 1. Enter < Access level> menu.
- 2. Select < Value Release> parameter and select one of available parameters: Guest, User, Advanced User, Administrator.

#### CAUTION!

Selecting <Guest> access level provides free access to printouts settings (no need to log in).

#### **Movies**

Default settings allow <Movies> menu to be accessed by the **Administrator** exclusively, as a result it is only the Administrator who can perform adding or deleting operations. Providing that respective modifications have been introduced by the Administrator, it is possible for remaining users to access



#### Procedure:

- 1. Enter < Access level> menu.
- 2. Select < Movies> parameter, select one of available parameters: Guest, User, Advanced User, Administrator.

#### CAUTION!

Selecting <Guest> access level provides free access to movies settings (no need to log in).

#### **Auto logout**

Auto logout parameter has been designed to trigger logout operation when the balance stays inactive for specified time interval given in minutes. By default the parameter is set to <None> parameter.

#### Procedure:

- 1. Enter < Access level> menu.
- 2. Select < Auto logout> parameter, select one of available parameters: None/3/5/15/30/60. Time given in [min].

#### **Databases**

The Administrator is authorized to set appropriate access level required in order to enable modification of databases.

#### **Procedure:**

- 1. Enter < Access level> menu.
- 2. Select < Databases> parameter, set required access level: Guest, User, Advanced User, Administrator for each of the databases.

#### CAUTION!

Selecting <Guest> access level provides free access to databases editing.

#### 13. PROFILES

A Profile is a data pack determining:

- functioning of working modes, e.g. parts counting, percent weighing, etc.,
- data to be displayed during working mode operation,
- function keys to be active,
- measuring units to be accessible
- criteria determining speed of operation and measurement stability,

Balance software allows you to create numerous profiles, this enables:

- each balance user to design an individual working environment
- customized balance operation, enabling/activating selected function keys and information (improving ergonomics of operation)

#### 13.1. CREATING A PROFILE

A default profile is named <Home>. The Administrator can create new profiles by:

- Copying an already existing profile, modifying it,
- Creating a new profile.

To simplify weighing instrument operation, there are 4 profiles in the software. The profiles are selected and saved so that the weighings for respective requirements and conditions are optimized.

These are the following profiles:

- Fast profile enabling weighing of any mass regardless of the working mode. When running the balance for the first time, this profile is started automatically. For this profile the parameters are selected in a way enabling obtaining the measurement result as fast as it is possible.
- **Fast dosing** the profile is dedicated for fast dosing. Selecting this profile causes automatic opening of the DOSING mode,
- Precision the profile is dedicated for precise dosing of any mass regardless of the working mode. For this profile the weighing process takes most of the time, but the result is the most accurate and precise,
- **User** the basic profile for which filter settings are selected in a way enabling fast and precise weighing. Selecting this profile causes automatic opening of the WEIGHING mode.

Caution: You can modify all settings of User profile. Settings of other profiles (Fast, Fast dosing and Precision) can be modified only to a limited extend. Each additional profile you created can be modified in terms of all settings.

#### Copying an existing profile

#### Procedure:

- 1. Enter main menu, to do it press **Setup** key.
- 2. Enter < Profiles> submenu.
- 3. Press and hold profile that is to be copied.
- 4. Menu referring to a profile record is displayed.
- 5. Select <Copy> parameter.
- 6. A new <Copy *name*> profile is created, all new profile setting and base profile settings are likewise.
- 7. Modify necessary data: (name, etc.).

#### Adding a new profile

#### Procedure:

- 1. Enter main menu, to do it press **Setup** key.
- 2. Enter < Profiles> submenu.
- 3. Press \int \text{key, message box: <Create new record?> is displayed.

4. Press key to confirm. The software automatically adds a new record and enters its editing mode.

#### Deleting a profile

#### Procedure:

- 1. Enter main menu, to do it press **Setup** key.
- 2. Enter < Profiles> submenu.
- 3. Press and hold profile that is to be deleted.
- 4. Menu referring to a profile record is displayed.
- 5. Select < Delete > parameter.
- 6. Message box: <Confirm to delete> is displayed.
- 7. Press key to confirm, the profile gets deleted.

#### CAUTION!

In order to operate profiles it is necessary to log in as an Administrator.

#### 13.2.1. **Settings**



#### Name

On entering this option, the display opens a message box with keyboard. Insert name of a profile and press key to confirm.

The name is assigned to the profile.



#### Default working mode

On entering this option you can select a specific working mode, which is set as default in a profile. For <None> parameter set, upon selecting the profile, the balance activates the most recently used working mode.

#### 13.2.2. Working Modes

On entering Working Modes option, the display opens a window containing all accessible working modes. Settings for each of the working modes can be customized, particular profile when activated runs with given set of parameters.

List of parameters to be modified:

- Settings
  - contain specific parameters relating to a working mode and universal settings, such as: result control, tare mode, automatic footer printout, printout mode, printout.
- Functions of quick access keys
  - declaring quick access keys to be visible in the bottom display bar
- Information
  - declaring information to be displayed in the grey workspace
- Printout
  - declaring type of a printout or defining a non-standard printout

#### 13.2.3. Readout

The function enables you to adjust balance operation to ambient conditions (filter settings) or your individual needs. <Readout> menu contains the following elements:



## FILTER (function unavailable for the following profiles: Fast, Fast dosing, Precision)

Each measurement signal before being displayed is electronically processed in order to provide correct parameters specific for stable measurement result, i.e. ready to read.

You can determine signal processing extend, there are five different filters for you to select form:

- very fast
- fast
- average / normal
- slow
- very slow

While setting the filter consider the actual operating conditions. In case of very good operating conditions select average/normal or fast filter, in case of rough conditions select slow or very slow filter.

#### CAUTION!

For precision balances it is recommended to select very fast, fast or average filter. For analytical balances and microbalances it is recommended to select average, slow, very slow filter.



## Value release (function unavailable for the following profiles: Fast, Fast dosing, Precision)

The parameter has been designed to determine when the stability marker is to be displayed.

There are three different settings for value release parameter:

- fac
- fast + reliable /recommended/
- reliable

#### CAUTION!

Both parameters, filter and value release, determine how long it takes to obtain stable result.



#### **Autozero function**

The function has been designed to enable automatically carried out monitoring and correction of zero indication.

If the function is enabled, the following measurement results are compared to each other in constant time intervals. If the results differ less than declared AUTOZERO range, e.g. 1 division, the balance is automatically zeroed, and the

markers of stable indication and precise zero • 0 are displayed.

Active AUTOZERO means, that each measurement starts from the precise zero point. There are, however, cases where the function may disturb the weighing process. For instance during very slow load placing or pouring onto the balance's weighing pan. In such case, the correcting system of zero indication may also correct the actual indication of a load placed on the weighing pan.

Accessible settings:

NO - autozero function disabledYES - autozero function enabled

Autozero function: Dosing (function unavailable for the following profiles: Fast, Fast dosing, Precision)



The function has been designed to set autozero to default value selected for dosing.

Accessible settings:

NO - autozero operation is automatically disabled on entering dosing mode
 YES - autozero operation is automatically enabled on entering dosing mode



#### Last digit

The function has been designed to enable/disable visibility of the last decimal place of measurement result.

Accessible settings:

**ALWAYS**: al the digits visible **NEVER**: last digit invisible

WHEN STABLE: last digit visible only for a stable measurement



#### **Ambient conditions**

The parameter refers to ambient conditions. By default it is set to value **Stable.** For unstable ambient conditions it is advisable to set the parameter to value **Unstable**.

**Stable** setting results with faster operation, i.e. weighing takes much less time than in case of setting to value **Unstable**.

Accessible settings:

#### 13.2.4. Measuring Units

For a selected profile you can declare start unit, supplementary unit and two custom measuring units.

A custom measuring unit features:

- A multiplier
- A name (3 characters)

Upon completed operation of designing a custom unit its name is added to the list of accessible measuring units.

Units menu additionally enables entering the value of gravitational acceleration force for balance's place of use. It is obligatory should a balance be used to determine mass in [N].



Working mode settings include special functions specific to a given mode. They enable customization of particular mode's operation. The special settings are activated on selecting a particular profile. For detailed overview of particular mode's special functions read section providing information on the mode in question.

#### 14.1. RUNNING WORKING MODE

To run a particular working mode:

1. Press active working mode name, it is displayed in the top left hand corner.




- 2. Wait for a list of available working modes to be displayed.
- 3. Select a particular working mode and press its name.

#### 14.2. PARAMETERS RELATED TO A WORKING MODE

Each working mode has programmable parameters determining its functioning. Procedure for entering the parameters:

- 1. Press grey workspace area
- 2. Wait to see the following menu:
  - Settings> additional options
  - Keys> defining quick access keys
  - <Information> selecting information to be displayed in the workspace
  - <Printouts> selecting printout type and content
  - <Profile> selecting a profile to be active in the course of operation





3. Enter particular submenu and select the component which is to be modified



#### 14.3. QUICK ACCESS KEYS, PROXIMITY SENSORS

You can define up to 7 quick access keys, which are displayed in the bottom bar.

On assigning a function to a button a corresponding pictogram appears in the bottom navigation bar of the main window. It is a so called quick access key, dedicated for most often used functions and processes.

Each working mode features customized set of buttons. For complete buttons list read Appendix B.



#### Caution:

You can view user manual saved to balance memory. In order to take advantage of this function help button



must be placed on a tool bar.

#### 14.3.1. Proximity Sensors

The balance features two proximity sensors enabling touch-free balance control.

The software detects four motions performed around the sensors:

- 1. hand in a close vicinity to the left sensor <Left sensor>,
- hand in a close vicinity to the right sensor <Right sensor>,
- 3. Hand motion to the left <Proximity sensor: left motion>,
- Hand motion to the right <Proximity sensor: right motion>.

#### CAUTION!

Using LEFT MOTION or RIGHT MOTION, it is necessary to remember that <Proximity sensors delay> parameter must be set to value **500 ms!** 

To each of the motions you can assign one of the available options: [None; Profile; Adjustment; Zeroing; Taring; Tare setting; Tare switch off; Reset tare; Packaging; Print; Header printing; Footer printing; Unit; Universal Variable 1; Universal Variable 2; Universal Variable 3; Universal Variable 4; Universal Variable 5; Confirm; Abort; User; Left door; Right door; Open/Close door; Parameters; Product, Warehouse; Customer].


The selected option is recognized by the software and performed when activated by a particular motion.

In order to ensure correct operation it is necessary remember to set the right sensors sensitivity and the right value for proximity sensors delay (for more information go to section 34 of this user manual).

#### 14.4. INFORMATION

Information on weighing process is displayed in the grey workspace. It can contain up to 6 data. If larger amount of data is selected, then only the first 6 are displayed. Each parameter features two options:


- YES, information enabled (displayed in the workspace).
- NO, information disabled.



#### 14.5. PRINTOUTS

Printouts menu comprises two separate sections:

- standard printouts,
- non-standard printouts.



### Standard printout

Standard printout comprises three internal sections featuring different variables. For each variable set option YES to include it in a standard printout. If option NO is selected, then the variable is disabled, i.e. it is not printed.

#### Procedure:

- 1. Press field with name of a template to be edited (Header Weighing Footer) and select variables to be printed.
- 2. If a printout is a non-standard one, create it.



### Basic principles related to printouts

- 1. In order to print WEIGHING section variables press PRINT button on balance's overlay, only variables with attribute YES can be printed (see the above list).
- 2. Variables with YES attribute present in the HEADER and FOOTER are printed ONLY on pressing PRINT HEADER and PRINT FOOTER pictograms. The pictograms have to be added to the bottom bar of the display, as guick access keys.

For detailed instruction on how to add quick access keys to the bottom bar of the display go to section 14.3.

### Non-standard printout

Non-standard printout may contain: TEXTS and VARIABLES (which are acquired from the software). Each non-standard printout is a separate project, featuring specific name, by which it is identified, and saved to the database of printouts.

#### Procedure:

- 1. Press <Non-standard printout> field.
- 2. Press < Add> button, a window featuring Name/Code/Project data opens.
- 3. Set name and code of a printout.
- 4. Press < Project> button, a keyboard is opened on the display for editing the printout.
- 5. Use the keyboard to design printout template, the printout may contain texts and variables.

#### CAUTION!

It is possible to add a printout by importing configured texts from flash drives connected to balance's USB port. Printout's name is ONLY a NAME, and it is not part of its content.

For information on how to design a non-standard printout template read section 30.19 < Printouts>.

#### 14.6. PROFILES

Profiles function has been described in section 13 Profiles.

### 15. WEIGHING OPERATION

Load a weighed object on a balance weighing pan. On stabilization of weighing result, indicated by stability marker we visible on the left side of balance display, read the measurement result.

Record / printout of the measurement result is available on pressing <PRINT> key:

- for verified balances only stable measurement result can be saved or printed (stability marker
   visible on balance's display),

#### 15.1. WEIGHING UNIT SELECTION

Change of weighing unit is carried out by pressing the weighing unit icon visible next to the value of measurement result. Clicking the unit triggers display of available units list. Select the unit you need, the software automatically recalculates indicated value.



#### 15.2. GOOD WEIGHING PRACTICE


In order to ensure long lasting use of a balance plus correct and reliable measurement of weighed loads, follow below procedures:

- Start the balance with no load on the weighing pan (permissible value of load on the weighing pan on balance start is ±10% of its maximum capacity).
- Load the weighing pan steadily avoiding shocks:




SI system units are accessible for non-verified balances

Place weighed loads centrally on the weighing pan:



Avoid side loading, in particular side shocks:




#### 15.3. BALANCE LEVELLING

The X2 series features AutoLEVEL System, which continuously monitors level status during balance operation. The level status is signaled in the top right hand corner of a display. The system continuously controls level, and on detecting any change it indicates appropriate information on the display and/or starts an alarm, as a result a window for adjusting the level is displayed.

### **Balance levelling procedure**

- 1. Press level status pictogram < > located in the top right hand corner of the display.
- 2. Control panel of leveling function is displayed, it features level status and balance's top elevation.



- 3. Level the balance, to do it turn the feet in a way indicated by blinking pictograms on the display <->- the level point moves towards the center of the level circle.
- 4. As the level point is in the center point, its colour changes from red to green which is a confirmation for correct level status.

### CAUTION!

The balance is equipped with Automatic Level Control mechanism. For detailed information go to section 34.8 of this user manual.

#### 15.4. BALANCE ZEROING

Zeroing is a function allowing to zero mass indication. In order to zero mass indication, press button. Mass indication of zero value is displayed together with precise zero  $^+0^+$  and stability  $^{-0}$  markers.

Zeroing process is an equivalent for determining new zero point, recognized by the balance as precise zero. Zeroing is possible only for stable status of display indication.

#### CAUTION!

Zeroing the display indication is possible only within  $\pm 2\%$  range of instrument's maximum capacity. If the zeroed value is above  $\pm 2\%$  of the maximum capacity, then the software indicates a respective error message, **Err2**.

#### 15.5. BALANCE TARING

Taring is a function allowing to determine net weight of a measured object. In order to determine net weight of the object, place object's container (packaging) on the weighing pan, and on stabilization of measurement result press key. The display indicates mass equal zero and symbols: **Net** and On taking off the weighed load and its packaging from the weighing pan, the display indicates sum of total tared mass with minus sign.

The software enables assigning tare value to a database-stored product. Using this option, the software automatically uploads data on tare value for a particular product upon its selection from the database.

#### CAUTION!

Taring negative values is impossible. On taring negative values the balance responds with an **Err3** message. In such case, zero balance indication and repeat taring procedure.

#### Manual tare determination

#### Procedure:



- 1. While in optional mode press quick access key,
- 2. An on-screen numeric keyboard is displayed.
- 3. Enter tare value and press key.
- 4. The balance returns to the weighing mode, and the display indicates entered tare value with minus '-' sign.

#### Deleting tare

The tare value indicated on a balance display can be deleted by pressing key on a balance overlay, or by using programmable function key <Deactivate tare>.

PROCEDURE 1 – on taking the tared load off the weighing pan

- 1. Press key.
- 2. The NET marker is deleted, and new zero point of the balance is determined.

PROCEDURE 2 – with tared load on the weighing pan

- 1. Press key.
- 2. The NET marker is deleted, and new zero point of the balance is determined.
- 3. When tare value exceeds 2% of the maximum capacity, Err message is displayed in order to inform you about the fact operation cannot be carried out.

PROCEDURE 3 – when the tared load is on the weighing pan or on taking the tared load off the weighing pan

- 1. Press programmable key < Deactivate tare>
- 2. The NET marker is deleted.
- 3. The display indicates tare value.
- 4. Press <Restore tare> key to restore the last tare value .

### 15.6. DUAL RANGE BALANCES (REFERS TO PS 200/2000.3Y BALANCE)

**PS 200/2000.Y2** balance is a dual range weighing device. Transition from weighing with accuracy of the **I weighing range** to weighing with accuracy of the **II weighing range** takes place automatically on exceeding Max<sub>1</sub> 200g. On entering the accuracy of the II weighing range, the display indicates **II** pictogram on its right side, the last digit becomes blank, the last but one digit turns to grey colour. From now on the balance continues weighing in the II weighing range.



To return to weighing with accuracy of the weighing range:

- take the load off the weighing pan
- as the indication returns to zero and when symbols  $\rightarrow 0\leftarrow$  and  $\blacktriangle \triangleleft$  are displayed, press


The balance returns to weighing with readability  $d_1$ =0.001g, the **II weighing range** symbol gets blanked, last but one digit is no longer grey.

#### 15.7. USE OF AIR BUOYANCY COMPENSATION FACTOR

The application enables correcting mass measurement errors in the course of:

1. weighing loads of density considerably different from the density of standard that has been used to adjust the balance; typically the balance is adjusted with a steel mass standard with density ~8.0g/cm3 or a brass mass standard with density ~8.7g/cm3; if loads made of other substances are weighed, then ratio indicated on below chart applies.

### Error value in relation to density of weighed sample



The chart presents correction values for mass in relation to the density of weighed load, assumption that air density is constant and equals 1.2 kg/m³ is taken.

2. testing sample mass change within a few hours long period of time for a case when the sample mass is relatively constant (minor changes); it is assumed that air density changes affect

Density of weighed load

considerably the final result, wherein the density is influenced by changes of pressure, temperature and humidity.

In order to carry out a reliable measurement it is necessary to know the measuring methods, features of tested sample, air density in the laboratory room and density of weighed sample.

### **Functioning**

The air buoyancy compensation procedure is to be used as follows:

1. Method 1:

Enter air density value and value of weighed sample density to balance's memory. Wait, the software automatically calculates the correction factor for weighed mass, next corrected value of weighed mass is displayed. In order to avoid mistakes, the corrected mass value is accompanied by <!> symbol, the symbol is visible on a display and a printout.

2. Method 2:

Determine air density value with use of balance software (semi-automatic operation) and enter value of weighed sample density to balance's memory.

Determination of air density is carried out using a set of two mass standards, one made of stainless steel, and the other one of aluminum. Based on mass indications of the two standards, the software automatically calculates the air density and saves the value in balance's memory on operator's confirmation. Now, enter value of weighed sample density to balance's memory. Wait, the software automatically calculates the correction factor for weighed mass, next corrected value of weighed mass is displayed. The corrected mass value is accompanied by <!> symbol, the symbol is visible on a display and a printout.

In order to enable/disable the air buoyancy compensation procedure go to the user menu. The procedure is valid for weighing mode exclusively.

### Air Buoyancy Compensation Start-Up

#### Procedure:

- 1. Enter home screen and press grey workspace.
- 2. Select <Settings> parameter.
- 3. Select < Air buoyancy compensation> parameter.

### Parameter values:

- Air buoyancy compensation YES/NO.
- Sample density (enter value of weighed sample density). If you use products from databases, then on product selection its density value is automatically uploaded.
- Air density parameter designed to enable selecting the method of entering the air density value.

### PARAMETER VALUES:

VALUE – select to open a window where you enter specified air density value (e.g.: determined by means of other methods). The entered value is used in the course of compensation. It is assigned

automatically upon completed air density determination after < > key has been pressed.

ONLINE – select to make the balance acquire air density value from a connected THB sensor at a real time, if such is connected to the balance, or from internal sensor installed in the balance.

If your balance features both types of sensors (THB module and internal sensor), then data from the THB module supersedes the other, in such case go to **Setup/Ambient Conditions/Ambient Conditions Module** and set SAVE or SAVE & ALERTS parameter.

If your balance features only one set of sensors recording temperature, humidity and pressure, then correct ONLINE operation requires setting the following parameters:

- internal sensors exclusively go to Setup/Ambient Conditions/Ambient Conditions Module and set NONE value.
- external THB module exclusively go to Setup/Ambient Conditions/Ambient Conditions
   Module and set SAVE or SAVE & ALERTS value.

For correct balance cooperation with the THB module it is necessary to set port's transmission parameters, they must be compatible with those of the THB module. The THB module transmission parameters are detailed on its data plate.

On returning to the weighing mode, the display indicates an additional symbol <!>, as indicated on the figure below. From now on the value of indicated mass is corrected including the air buoyancy compensation factor and sample density.



The measurement result can only be compensated by a correct value if the operator enters the actual value of the air density and correct value of weighed sample density to balance's memory.

#### CAUTION!

If the <AIR BUOYANCY COMPENSATION> parameter is set to <ONLINE> parameter, then pictogram <!> is not displayed. This means that parameter **Setup/Ambient Conditions/Ambient Conditions Module** is set to SAVE or SAVE & ALERTS value, and that there is no physical connection between a balance and a THB module, or that balance-module communication parameters are incorrect. In such case plug a THB module to balance's ports COM 1 or COM 2 and set appropriate communication parameters, for the parameters refer to a data plate.

#### 15.8. ADDITIONAL PARAMETERS FOR A WEIGHING PROCESS

Modification of weighing functions enables programming balance operation.

#### Procedure:

- 1. Press grey workspace.
- 2. Settings, Keys, Information, Printouts, Profile submenus are displayed.
- 3. Select submenu, press it, select submenu item that is to be modified.
  - <Settings> additional options related to weighing mode
  - <Keys> defining quick access keys
- <Information> supplementary data on weighing process displayed in Info field
- <Printouts> selecting printout type
- <Profile> selecting profile that is to be active during balance operation
- <SETTINGS> weighing process related data such as:

#### Tare mode

SINGLE

mass value stored in balance memory on single pressing of TARE key, the following pressing of TARE key determines new value of tare. Selection of product or packaging with assigned tare value causes automatic deleting of previously assigned tare value;

SUM OF ACTIVE

sum of product tare value and packaging tare value (this operation is a consequence of selecting a product and a packaging from database) plus tare value entered using balance's numeric keyboard if needed. When new tare value for a product or packaging is entered then tare value entered manually gets deactivated.

SUM OF ALL

Sum of all entered tare values.

AUTOTARE

### Means of operation:

Each first stable measurement result is tared. The NET pictogram is displayed. Now you can determine net mass of weighed load. On unloading the weighing pan, and as the indication returns to autozero zone, the software automatically deletes tare value.

### **Automatic footer printout**

Options:

• MODE – No – manual footer printout,

Sum of measurements – footer is printed when mass value entered in <Threshold> parameter is out of range

Measurements quantity – footer is printed when a pre-defined measurements quantity (a batch) set in parameter <Threshold> is carried out

• THRESHOLD – setting the threshold value determining footer printout.

For <Sum of measurements> parameter threshold is determined in measuring unit [g], for <Measurements quantity> parameter the unit is not determined, provided value specifies carried out measurements quantity.

### Printout mode / release

PRINT / release button, (manual operation)

Never – printout deactivated

First stable – the first stable measurement is printed

Each stable - all stable measurements are set for printing

Each – all measurements are printed (stable and unstable), in case of a verified balance only stable ones (as in setting <Each stable>)

AUTOMATIC MODE

Never – printout deactivated

First stable – the first stable measurement result obtained after placing a load on balance's weighing pan is recorded, record of the following measurement result takes place only on unloading the weighing pan, returning of the mass indication below set threshold's value, and placing another load on the weighing pan

Last stable – only the last stable measurement is accepted, i.e. measurement recorded before taking the load off the weighing pan. The record takes place on taking the load off the weighing pan, and returning of the mass indication below set threshold's value.

With interval – automatic printout and record of weighing results, carried out in a cyclic manner as often as specified by <INTERVAL> parameter. The interval is set in minutes, values range is 1 – 9999.

#### **CAUTION!**

Each weighing result is printed and recorded (both stable and unstable for non-verified balance, stable for verified balance).

The measurements start to be printed and recorded as soon as you enable automatic operation with interval. First stable weighing result of value higher than THRESHOLD value is recorded as the first measurement. Successive measurements are printend as often as specified by <INTERVAL> parameter. To end automatic operation with interval disable this function.

THRESHOLD

mass value obligatory for operation of automatic printout, set in grams.

INTERVAL

Record frequency for automatic operation with interval

### **Printout**

Printout type related to a working mode. Printout is activated by pressing PRINT key on the overlay.

Options:

STANDARD PRINTOUT

Enables declaring printout content: HEADER, WEIGHING DATA and FOOTER. Select <YES> parameter for the components that are to be printed on pressing printout activating function key.

NON-STANDARD PRINTOUT

Enables selecting one of database-stored non-standard printouts form a list of <PRINTOUTS> menu, or designing a unique printout which is automatically added to the database.

Caution: For information on how to design printouts go to section 14.5.

### Air buoyancy compensation

Parameters allowing you to switch on the compensation and to enter weighed sample density data and air density data.

CAUTION! The function is valid for weighing mode exclusively.

For information on how to set air buoyancy compensation go to the previous section.

#### 15.9. MINIMUM SAMPLE WEIGHT

The weighing mode settings comprise <Minimum sample weight> function. In order to use the function it is necessary to enter data related to minimum sample weight determination methods and minimum sample weight values for a given method. The data must be entered to < Minimum sample weight> database. The database is empty in standard balance version.

Determining minimum sample weight and adding data to the database: </Minimum sample weights> database can be carried out by an authorized "RADWAG" personnel exclusively.

Should you use the minimum sample weight function, and need data on minimal sample weight to be entered to balance menu, please contact the local representative of "RADWAG" company.

An authorized RADWAG representative determines the minimum sample weight depending on packaging mass. The process is carried out with mass standards, in balance place of use and in accordance with the requirements of the accepted quality system. The obtained values are entered to balance software: <Minimum sample weights> database.

A minimum sample weight determining method may have a few tare values defined, along with assigned values of minimum sample weights, expiry dates of the carried out measurements and entered data. The settings are not to be edited by a balance user.

Using <Minimum sample weight> function guarantees that the results of completed weighing processes are within set tolerance limits, and they comply with the requirements of the quality system accepted by an organization.

CAUTION! The function is valid for weighing mode exclusively.

#### PARAMETER VALUES:

METHOD

Option allowing you to designate used quality standard. Press METHOD field to open a window with a list of database-stored methods by means of which the minimum sample weights were determined. In order to add a new method you have to go to <Databases /Minimum sample weights>

MODE

**Lock** – select in order to make the balance display pictograms informing you on status of weighed mass (weighed mass below/above minimum sample weight) and to disable accepting the measurement result if it is below the minimum sample weight limit

**Warn** – select in order to make the balance display pictograms informing you on status of weighed mass (weighed mass below/above minimum sample weight). You can accept the measurement result if it is below the minimum sample weight limit, mind that on a printout it will be preceded by an asterisk (\*).

### CAUTION!


For information on how to enter a method for minimum sample weight go to section 30.14 < Databases /Minimum sample weights>. New minimum sample weight values can be entered by an authorized "RADWAG" personnel exclusively.

### Weighing with use of <MINIMUM SAMPLE WEIGHT> function

With <Minimum sample weight> function on you are informed whether the measurement is out of minimum sample weight limit determined for a specific weighing range. To turn the function on go to the weighing mode settings.

#### Procedure:

- 1. Press grey workspace.
- 2. Settings, Keys, Information, Printouts and Profiles submenus are displayed.
- 3. Select <Settings> menu additional weighing process options.
- Press < Minimum sample weight> field.
- 5. Wait for Minimum sample weight window to open.



- 6. Press <Method> field, window with a list of database-stored methods opens.
- 7. Select the method you need.
- 8. Previous screen is displayed.
- 9. Press <Mode> field, window with the following parameters opens:

**Lock** – select in order to make the balance display pictograms informing you on status of weighed mass (weighed mass below/above minimum sample weight) and to disable accepting the measurement result if it is below the minimum sample weight limit


**Warn** – select in order to make the balance display pictograms informing you on status of weighed mass (weighed mass below/above minimum sample weight). You can accept the measurement result if it is below the minimum sample weight limit, mind that on a printout will be preceded by an asterisk (\*).

10. Set the parameters and exit the menu.

11. A new pictogram is displayed in mass field. The pictogram indicates current status of mass

in relation to the pre-determined value of minimum sample weight.








Mass above the set minimum sample weight value specified for a given tare range.




CAUTION!

If more than one reference tare value is programmed (with corresponding minimum sample weight mass) then the indicated value automatically moves to a range corresponding to the weight of the tared container. At the same time the required minimum mass is changed.

#### 15.10. COOPERATION WITH TITRATORS

In order to provide correct cooperation with Titrators, go to settings of standard printout content and set <Mass value for a titrator> parameter to <Yes> parameter. With this, other variables for the printout are turned off.





With <Yes> parameter on, a respective pictogram is displayed in the top bar of a home screen. The pictogram informs on special format of mass printout, permissible by TITRATORS.

### 16. PARTS COUNTING


Parts counting> is a working mode enabling determination of quantity of small parts with equal weight. Determined mass of a single part is used for the counting procedure. The single part mass may be:

- determined from a reference quantity of parts subjected to weighing,
- acquired from database of products,
- · entered manually as a numeric value.

### Procedure for activation of Parts Counting mode:

- 1. Go to the home screen, press pictogram.
- 2. <Working modes> submenu with list of available operation modes opens.
- Select < Parts counting> mode, home screen featuring parts counting pictogram in a top bar is automatically displayed.

#### Parts Counting mode screen.




- 1. Setup press to access balance menu
- Print header press to print data declared in the header
- 3. Print footer press to print data declared in the footer
- 4. Products Database press to select products from a corresponding database
- 5. Set part mass press to edit field for entering mass of a single part
- Determine part press to set mass of a single part using reference sample comprising specified number of parts, e.g.: 10 pcs, 20 pcs, 75 pcs, etc.

#### 16.1. SUPPLEMENTARY SETTINGS FOR PARTS COUNTING MODE

The supplementary settings enable adjusting the working mode to your needs and requirements. To access the settings follow the below procedure.

#### Procedure:

- 1. Press grey field, menu is displayed.
- 2. Select <Settings> parameter, list of functions related to Parts Counting mode is displayed:



- ACAI, Automatic Accuracy Correction values:
  - YES, single part mass is updated,
  - NO, single part mass is not updated.
- **Minimum reference mass**: 1unit, 2units, 5units, 10units, it is the minimal mass value of a single part. Unless the condition is met, counting process cannot start.
- Result control:
  - YES, print and save only those measurements which are included within the Lo and Hi thresholds.
  - NO, all measurements are printed and saved.
- Tare mode
- Automatic footer printout
- Printout mode / Value release
- Printouts

For means of operation of ACAI function read below, to find out more about the remaining functions go to section 15.8.

### Means of operation of ACAI function:

- 1. Number of parts (on adding) on the weighing pan has to be greater than before.
- 2. Number of parts (on adding) on the weighing pan must be less than twice the amount displayed before adding the parts.
- 3. Current quantity of parts must be within  $\pm$  0,3 tolerance of the total value.
- Measurement result has to be stable.

#### 16.2. SETTING REFERENCE MASS BY ENTERING DETERMINED PART MASS

### Procedure:

- 1. Press < 2.47 Determine part mass> key or the label 0.000g, <Reference mass> editing window featuring an on-screen keyboard is displayed.
- 2. Enter the requested value and confirm by pressing key, < Parts counting> mode is run with automatically specified part mass.

#### CAUTION!

If you enter weight of value that is lower than 0.1 reading unit, then < Value too low> message is displayed.

#### 16.3. SETTING REFERENCE MASS BY DETERMINING PART MASS

#### Procedure:

- 1. Put a container on a weighing pan, tare its mass.
- 2. Press < Determine part mass> button, <Reference quantity> editing window featuring an on-screen keyboard is displayed.
- 3. Enter the requested value and confirm by pressing key.
- 4. Message on number of parts to be loaded is displayed: **<Number of parts to be loaded: xx>** (where xx previously entered value).
- 5. Put specified number of parts on the weighing pan, when the result is stable (► stability pictogram displayed) press key to confirm.
- 6. The software automatically recalculates single part mass, next it moves to < Parts counting> mode displaying number of parts loaded on the weighing pan (pcs marking).

#### CAUTION!

It is important to remember the following:

- Total mass of all parts loaded on the weighing pan must not exceed the maximum capacity (weighing range) of the balance;
- Total mass of all parts loaded on the weighing pan must not be lower than value declared in parameter "Minimum reference mass". Unless this condition is met, the balance displays a message: <Sample mass too low>;
- Mass of a single part must not be lower than **0,1** of balance reading unit. Unless this condition is met, the balance displays a message: **<Single part mass too low>**.

#### 16.4. ACQUIRING PART MASS FROM A DATABASE

Each product recorded in a database of products features set of information which allow to identify it. Among the information there is mass value used during part counting process.

### Procedure:

Operating < Parts counting> mode, press < Products> button and using the list select a particular product.

#### Entering reference mass to balance memory

Procedure for entering single part mass to products database:

- 1. Press <Setup> button, next press <Databases> button.
- 2. Go to products database and press < Products > button.
- 3. Press product name and modify weight value (field [5]).
- 4. Return to <Parts counting> mode.

Procedure for entering single part mass to products database when there is no data entered yet:

- 1. Press <Setup> button, next press <Databases> button.
- 2. Go to products database and press < Add> button.
- 3. Fill in product related fields, weight value (field [5]) among many.
- 4. Return to <Parts counting> mode.

### 16.5. UPDATING PART MASS IN A DATABASE

Determined single part mass can be assigned to a product in the database of products. This option is applied while using ACAI (Automatic Accuracy Correction) function in order to determine part mass with high accuracy.

### Procedure:

Determine single part mass.

- 2. Press < Products> button.
- 3. Press and hold name of a product mass of which is to be updated.
- 4. Contextual menu is displayed.
- 5. Select **<Assign reference sample mass> parameter**, reference mass is saved to a product record under **<Mass>** entry.



#### 16.6. PARTS COUNTING PROCEDURE

The first step for Parts Counting mode is obtaining data on mass of a single part. Select one of available options:

- Give weight value of a single part (see section 16.3) and put parts to be counted on the weighing pan, balance displays total amount of parts.
- Determine mass of a single part from a given quantity of parts (see section 16.4.). Put parts to be counted on the weighing pan, the balance displays total amount of parts. In the course of calculation, ACAI function pictogram <\*\*-> is displayed (providing the function is active).
- Acquire mass of a single part from database of products (see section 16.5.) by selecting a
  desired product record. Put parts to be counted on the weighing pan, the balance displays total
  amount of parts.

#### CAUTION!

Any additional elements (packaging) shall be tared prior to counting process start.

### 16.7. CHECKWEIGHING FOR PARTS COUNTING MODE

Parts counting process can be aided by checkweighing function, i.e. control whether indication is within set thresholds.

Checkweighing requires setting values for two thresholds:

- LOW threshold [Min= ... parts]
- HIGH threshold [Max= ... parts]

and setting YES value for Bar graph. The Bar graph displays relation:


CURRRENT NO. OF PARTS / CHECKWEIGHING THRESHOLDS.

In order to define Low and High thresholds' values open Products Database and edit the Product record, or use a quick access key, < Defining thresholds>.

#### Procedure:

- 1. Press grey workspace, next select <Information> parameter.
- 2. Set Bar graph to YES value, return to parts counting mode.
- 3. Press grey workspace, next select <Keys> parameter.
- 4. Assign <Checkweighing Thresholds> parameter to one of the quick access keys displayed in the bottom bar.
- 5. Return to parts counting mode.
- 6. Press < Checkweighing thresholds> key and enter values for LOW and HIGH thresholds, return to parts counting mode.

- 7. Bar graph is displayed, its colour corresponds to the status of parts counting process.
  - Yellow: current number of parts below the set Low threshold value
  - Green: current number of parts within set thresholds
  - Red: current number of parts above the set High threshold value



#### 16.8. DOSING FOR PARTS COUNTING MODE


Parts counting process can be aided by dosing function, i.e. control aiming to observe whether the indication does not exceed the set target value.

Dosing requires setting a target value, e.g. 100 parts, and a % tolerance. The bar graph displays the target value as a bracket.

In order to define target mass value press quick access key, < Target Value>

#### Procedure:

- 1. Press grey workspace, next select <Information> parameter.
- 2. Set Bar graph to YES value, return to parts counting mode.
- 3. Press grey workspace, next press <Keys> parameter.
- 4. Assign <Target Value> parameter to one of the quick access keys displayed in the bottom bar.
- 5. Return to parts counting mode.
- 6. Press Target Value> key and enter value corresponding to number of parts you want to have.
- 7. Bar graph is displayed. It provides the following information:
  - Current number of parts on the weighing pan (indicated by means of colour see section 16.7.),
  - Target Mass value (black marker).




### CAUTION!

The checkweighing and dosing functions can operate simultaneously in the parts counting mode. In such case the dosing tolerance is controlled by Lo and Hi thresholds of the checkweighing function.

### 17. CHECKWEIGHING

Checkweighing> is a working mode using two thresholds (Min and Max) for control of samples weight. Usually the weight is considered to be correct if it is comprised within threshold values.

### Checkweighing mode screen.



- Setup press to access balance menu
- 2. Print header press to print data declared in the header
- 3. Print footer press to print data declared in the footer
- 4. Products Database press to select products from a corresponding database
- 5. Set Tare press to enter tare
- 6. Checkweighing thresholds press to declare low and high threshold values.

### 17.1. MAKING USE OF CHECKWEIGHING THRESHOLDS

In order to use checkweighing thresholds:

- Products> button and select product with Min and Max threshold declared.
- Enter numerical value for the thresholds using < button, in this case thresholds do not refer to any product.

### PROCEDURE 1 – selecting product from Products Database

- 1. Press < Products> button.
- 2. Using product list, select the product that is to be weighed.
- 3. Threshold values are displayed automatically within an INFO area.
- 4. Bar graph is displayed, its colour corresponds to the current status of weight.
  - Yellow: weight value below Min threshold value
  - Green: weight value within set threshold values
  - Red: weight value above Max threshold value

### PROCEDURE 2 – entering checkweighing thresholds manually

- Press < Checkweighing Thresholds> button.
   Select Min threshold button and enter low limit value.
- 3. Press < button for confirmation.
- 4. Select Max threshold button and enter high limit value.
- 5. Press < > button for confirmation.

#### CAUTION!

Max threshold value has to be greater than Min threshold value.



### 18. DOSING

< Dosing> is a working mode enabling performance of sampling process, wherein the sampling takes as long as it is necessary to obtain pre-defined target weight.



#### 18.1. MAKING USE OF PRODUCTS DATABASE FOR DOSING OPERATION

You can use target values assigned to a product or values recorded in Product Database. You can also define temporary target values. In Product Database target value is determined by Mass field.

### **PROCEDURE 1** – selecting product from Products Database

- 1. Press < Products> button.
- 2. Using product list, select the product that is to be weighed.
- 3. Target and tolerance values are displayed automatically within an INFO area.
- 4. Target value with minus sign is displayed.







### 19. PERCENT WEIGHING

Percent weighing> is a working mode enabling comparison of a measured sample with the reference mass. The result is expressed in [%].

PERCENT WEIGHING function can be aided by DOSING and CHECKWEIGHING functions. Mind that these are not started automatically, neither is bar graph.

#### Percent weighing mode screen.



- 1. Setup press to access balance menu
- 2. Print header press to print data declared in the header
- 3. Print footer press to print data declared in the footer
- 4. Products Database press to select products from a corresponding database
- Percent Weighing press to set reference mass
- 6. Percent Weighing press to set as 100%.
- 7. Help manual

#### 19.1. COMPARISON OF A SAMPLE AND A REFERENCE MASS

### Comparison methods:

Entering mass of a standard, to do it use < Set reference mass> button

Accepting current mass loaded on the weighing pan as a reference mass, to do it use < Set as 100%> button.

• Selecting a product from products database (mind that the selected product mass has to be specified), to do it use < Products> button.

### PROCEDURE 1 - manual declaring of reference mass

- 1. Press < Set reference mass> button.
- 2. Window for entering reference mass value opens, enter the value and press < bull> button for confirmation.
- 3. Mass of all weighed products is compared to reference mass, the weight difference is displayed in [%].

### PROCEDURE 2 – accepting current load mass as reference mass (standard)

- 1. Put the sample on a weighing pan.
- 2. On measurement result stabilization, press < Set as 100%> button.
- 3. 100.000% indication is displayed, loaded part weight is accepted as a reference mass, it is automatically recorded and displayed in reference mass field.
- 4. Remove the sample form the weighing pan.
- 5. All samples weighed afterwards are compared with the reference mass, and the display indicates the difference, expressed in [%], for each weighed sample in relation to the reference mass.

### PROCEDURE 3 – selecting a product from Products Database


- 1. Press Products> button, using displayed product list select the product that is to be weighed.
- 2. "Info" field automatically displays new information on reference mass and product.
- 3. Reference mass relating to the product is recorded automatically and displayed in reference mass field, to modify the value press < > > button.
- 4. 0.00 % indication is displayed (for unloaded pan).
- 5. All samples weighed afterwards are compared with the reference mass, and the display indicates the difference, expressed in [%], for each weighed sample in relation to the reference mass.


#### 19.2. CHECKWEIGHING AND DOSING FOR PERCENT WEIGHING MODE

PERCENT WEIGHING function can be aided by DOSING and CHECKWEIGHING functions. In order to make them accessible assign them to an on-screen key. Remember to provide percent values for both of the functions.

#### Procedure:

- 1. Press grey workspace.
- 2. Settings, Keys, Information, Printouts and Profiles submenus are displayed.
- 3. Select <Keys> submenu.
- 4. The display indicates a list of soft keys, functions and proximity sensors.
- 5. Press one of available options and assign a corresponding function.





#### **CHECKWEIGHING**

Checkweighing function facilitates control of sample mass, mind that low and high thresholds, given in [%], are required.

#### Procedure:

- 1. Press < Checkweighing Thresholds> button.
- 2. Select Min threshold button and enter low limit value in [%].
- 3. Press < button for confirmation.
- 4. Select Max threshold button and enter high limit value in [%].
- 5. Press < button for confirmation.

#### CAUTION!

Max threshold value has to be greater than Min threshold value.

#### DOSING

Dosing function requires target value to be specified (it must be given in [%]) along with dosing tolerance, i.e. permissible +/- surplus or shortfall.

#### Procedure:


- 1. Press < Target Value > button.
- 2. Enter the target value in [%].
- 3. If tolerance applies, set its value.
- 4. Press < button for confirmation.
- 5. Select Max threshold button and enter high limit value in [%].

### 19.3. BARGRAPH - A TOOL FOR FUNCTION INTERPRETATION

The DOSING and CHECKWEIGHING functions are aided by a graphic indication, i.e. bar graph.







- Components of density determination kit shall be stored in a respective box.
- Weighing pans and sinker shall not be put directly on a table, this might cause their damage.
- Weighing pans and sinker, if not operated, shall be put on an additional stand.

#### 20.2. INSTALLATION PROCEDURE:



#### CAUTION!

If the kit has been installed and -nuLL- message is displayed than the balance shall be loaded with weights set (12). Thus prepared balance can be used for density determination.

#### 20.3. SOLIDS DENSITY DETERMINATION

Prior the procedure start it is necessary to determine the following process related data:

• liquid type (distilled water, ethanol, other liquid with determined density),

- liquid temperature (required in case of water or ethanol),
- liquid density (set automatically for water or ethanol upon the temperature has been entered, set manually for <Other> liquid).

The density of solids is calculated using the following formula:

$$\rho = \frac{A}{A - B} \rho_o$$

#### Where:

ρ - density of a sample

A - sample mass measured in the air

B - sample mass measured in liquid

ρ<sub>o</sub>- liquid density

#### **Procedure:**

- 1. Install the density determination kit.
- 2. In order to record density value for a particular product in products database, go to <Settings> menu, set <Assign density to product> parameter and press <Product> quick access key to make the product active.
- 3. Press Density of solids > button, respective menu is displayed, using it set the following parameters: Standard liquid, Temperature, Standard liquid density.

- 5. Load the TOP density kit pan with a sample, wait for a stable measurement result and press < br/>

#### 20.4. DETERMINING DENSITY OF LIQUIDS

In order to determine density of liquid first determine sinker's density in the air, next in the liquid. The density of liquid is calculated according to a formula:

$$\rho = \frac{A - B}{V} + d$$

#### Where:

ρ - density of liquid

A - sinker's mass measured in the air

B - sinker's mass measured in tested liquid

V - sinker's volume

d - air density (max 0,001 g/cm<sup>3</sup>)

Install the density determination kit, and enter sinker's volume to balance's memory.







#### 20.5. AIR DENSITY

Air density value is required for calculation of correction of measurement result related to air BUOYANCY compensation. Another value required for the calculation is weighed sample density. The function of air density determining is enabled only in balances with reading unit lower than d=1mg.

Determining density of air requires using a dedicated set of mass standards (additional equipment), specific for a balance model.

### Procedure:

- 1. Press < Air density > button.
- 2. Options related to Air density mode are displayed.



- 3. Press field for entering steel mass standard weight and enter the mass standard value as provided in its calibration certificate.
- 4. Press field for entering aluminium mass standard weight and enter the mass standard value as provided in its calibration certificate.
- 5. Press field for entering steel mass standard density and enter the density value.

- 6. Press field for entering aluminium mass standard density and enter the density value.
- 7. Press START field, air density determining begins.





- 8. Load the pan with steel mass standard, wait for a stable measurement result and press < button.
- 9. Load the pan with aluminium mass standard, wait for a stable measurement result and press <



- 10. Density result is displayed.
- 11. Press < button to finish the procedure.

The value of determined air density is automatically assigned to <Air density> parameter in <Settings/ Air buoyancy compensation> menu for weighing working mode.

### 20.6. DETERMINIG DENSITY USING PYCNOMETER

Prior the procedure start it is necessary to determine the following process related data:

- Pycnometer weight (if pycnometer weight is known, it is measured once only when filled with substance)
- Pycnometer volume

- 4. Fill in the pycnometer with tested substance, follow the pycnometer guidelines.
- 5. Load the pan with a pycnometer, wait for a stable measurement result and press button.
- 6. Density result is displayed.

7. Press < > button to finish the procedure.

CAUTION!

Pressing < > key starts another density determining process with the same settings.

### Procedure 2 – when pycnometer weight has not been entered

- 1. In order to record density value for a particular product in products database, go to <Settings> menu, set <Assign density to product> parameter and press <Product> quick access key to make the product active.
- 2. Press < Pycnometer> button, respective menu is displayed, using it set the following parameters: pycnometer volume.
- 3. Press < START> button, density determining begins.
- 4. Load the pan with an empty pycnometer, wait for a stable measurement result and press > button.
- 5. Take the pycnometer off the pan, fill it with tested substance, follow the pycnometer guidelines.
- 6. Load the pan with a pycnometer containing the substance, wait for a stable measurement result and press > button.
- 7. Density result is displayed.
- 8. Press < > button to finish the procedure.

CAUTION!

Pressing < > key starts another density determining process with the same settings.







### 21. ANIMAL WEIGHING

Animal weighing> is a working mode enabling reliable determination of mass of weighed objects in motion. In principle, this type of objects generate unstable measurement, thus it requires using a different filtering method of measurement signal.

### 21.1. ANIMAL WEIGHING MODE SETTINGS

Set Animal Weighing mode with reference to weighed object analysis method.

### **Procedure:**

- 1. Press < Animal weighing > button.
- 2. List of Animal Weighing parameters is displayed:

**Averaging time** - amount of time during which measurement records of weighed sample are analysed. Obtained data is used to determine measurement result.

**Automatic operation** - determines start criterion for measurements: whether they are initiated manually /on pressing a key/ or automatically.

A measurement starts automatically if indication on balance's display exceeds the value of set threshold.

The following measurement can start on unloading the weighed object from balance's pan (the indication has to return below the value set in threshold), loading a new object on balance's pan and exceeding the threshold's value by the indication.

**Threshold** - it is a value expressed in mass measuring units.

in order to start measurement, the indication has to exceed value set in the threshold.

- 3. Set parameters and return to weighing.
- 4. Load the weighing pan with an object to be weighed, press < > button
- 5. "Locked" measurement result is displayed.
- 6. In order to proceed to the next measurement press < > button
  - in case of manual operation mode, press < > button,
  - in case of automatic operation mode, unload the weighing pan and load it with the new object to be weighed.

### 22. FORMULATIONS


Formulations> is a working mode enabling you to prepare multi-ingredient mixture. The whole process is performed automatically.

While making mixtures you can:

- **use formulations database**, the software helps you dose particular ingredients, you are prompted with messages providing you with respective instruction,
- **make mixture on your own**, without using formulations database, with this option you control ingredients dosing, order and quantity by yourself.

If you want to use formulations database, first you have to make formulation, next apply it. Making formulations is possible using Formulation Database option. Read down below for detailed procedure.

### Formulations mode screen.



- Setup press to access balance menu
- Print header press to print data declared in the header
- 3. Print footer press to print data declared in the footer
- 4. Formulation press to select formulation out of the database
- 5. Formulation multiplier (formulation is activated on setting <Multiplier's editing> parameter to <NO> parameter)
- 6. Target mass
- 7. Formulation using out of database ingredients

#### 22.1. SUPPLEMENTARY SETTINGS FOR FORMULATIONS MODE

The supplementary settings enable adjusting the working mode to your needs and requirements. For information on how to access the settings read below.

#### Procedure:

- 1. Press grey workspace.
- 2. Settings, Keys, Information, Printouts and Profiles submenus are displayed.
- 3. Press <Settings> key.
- 4. The display indicates functions related to formulation making process.

### Formulation making process functions:

### Automatic ingredients naming:

- YES
- NO

#### Apply tare from database:

- YES each ingredient has a tare value assigned (the value is assigned on the basis of data for a particular product saved to the products database);
- NO tare is not applied

### Means of ingredient verification:

Use this function to specify how to determine ingredient mass during formulation making process, by TOLERANCE or by THRESHOLDS.

- TOLERANCE: the software accepts mass of an ingredient as correct if it is within set percent tolerance of total ingredient's mass (±%) (data acquired from database of products).
- THRESHOLDS: the software accepts mass of an ingredient as correct if it is within set thresholds (data acquired from database of products).

Specified method is in effect for all ingredients in the formulation making process.

If during formulation making process one of the ingredients is weighed in excess (its mass is out of high tolerance limit) the following message is displayed upon ingredient weight confirmation: <VALUE OUT OF RANGE, RECALCULATE THE FORMULATION?>. Confirm, the software automatically recalculates mass of other ingredients so that the mixture proportions are correct.

In order to make THRESHOLDS option active, the product/ingredient related data in database **must correspond** with value selected for <MEANS OF INGREDIENT VERIFICATION> parameter, i.e. ingredient thresholds are specified and <THRESHOLDS> parameter is selected for <MEANS OF INGREDIENT VERIFICATION> parameter, otherwise particular ingredients mass recalculation is not possible, i.e. ingredient thresholds are specified and <TOLERANCE> parameter is selected for <MEANS OF INGREDIENT VERIFICATION> parameter.

### Multiplier's editing

Function designed to enable making multiple mixtures according to a selected formulation in a single weighing process:

- YES on selecting a formulation for processing the software requests for multiplier's value, the
  provided value is in effect for all ingredients in the formulation making process, i.e. each
  ingredient is multiplied by the value.
- NO multiplier value is disabled, default value is set to <1>

**Printout**, for information on how to operate this function read section 15.8. "Additional Parameters for a Weighing Process".

#### 22.2. ADDING FORMULATION TO FORMULATIONS DATABASE

Formulation database contains formulations names, ingredients names and their weight. Each product used for formulation making process is saved to the database of products. When preparing a formulation, first name it, next add ingredients.

The software is intuitive and you are guided by means of respective prompts. Since each ingredient must have its name and mass specified you have to know the exact composition of the total mixture. In order to add a new formulation enter the formulation database.

#### Procedure:

- 1. Enter < Databases> submenu, press < Formulations> button.
- 2. Press < Add> button for adding a new formulation.

New record is added and edited automatically. Enter necessary data.

### List of formulation parameters:

- Name: click Name button, new window opens, go to the window and enter formulation name.
- Code: click code button, enter code number.
- Ingredients: click ingredients button, list of formulation ingredients is displayed (for new formulation the list is empty), add the ingredients:
  - press < Add> button,
  - select one of the following options:
    - <New ingredient> select to add a new product, first enter name, next specify mass to be weighed during formulation making process. The software automatically adds the products to the products database.
    - CAUTION! In order to enter remaining product data it is necessary to go to product database.
    - <New ingredient from database> select to view a list of database stored products, choose the product you need for your mixture, the software weighs as much product/ingredient as specified by product database mass parameter. Mass value can be edited and modified for each added product. The introduced modifications do not affect mass value saved to the database.
- Number of ingredients: non-editable parameter updated by the software on adding an ingredient to a formulation.
- Sum: target mass of a formulation, i.e. sum of all formulation ingredients, non-editable parameter updated by the software on adding an ingredient to a formulation.

### 22.3. USING FORMULATIONS IN WEIGHING

With FORMULATIONS function activated, you can prepare mixture either manually or by selecting formulation out of database.

Mixture preparation options:

- formulation that is not saved to the Formulation Database i.e. "manually",
- formulation that is saved to the Formulation Database.
- formulation that is saved to the Formulation Database using multiplier function.
- formulation that is saved to the Formulation Database determining target mass of complete formulation

#### CAUTION!

In order to use the above options it is necessary to add respective quick access keys to the bottom bar and set formulations mode parameters.

Select a particular formulation, weigh each of its ingredients. Wait for the indication to stabilize next press < > button, with this weight of each ingredient is tared, i.e. it is accepted for the total mass of the formulation.

Press < > button to cancel the formulation making process. Now you can prepare a different formulation.

**PROCEDURE 1** – preparing formulation that is not saved to the Formulation Database – i.e. "manually".

### Following the prompts:

  - <Save and close> select to save the process to formulations database, the process is finished automatically, the final report is recorded in formulation database.
  - <Close> select to complete without saving the process to formulations database the process is finished automatically, the final report is recorded in formulation database.
- 11. Press < > button for confirmation.
- 12. Formulation home screen is displayed, message "Completed" is visible in the bottom bar. To proceed press < > button.

### CAUTION!

It is possible to abort formulation making process at any moment, to abort the process press < Abort> button.

**PROCEDURE 2** – Preparing formulation that is saved to the Formulation Database. Basic option for creating recipes. Procedure 2 facilitates preparing mixtures with multiplied amount of ingredients.

### Following the prompts:

- 1. Press < Formulation> button.
- 2. List of formulations is displayed, select the formulation that is to be carried out.
- 3. Press < Formulation with multiplier> button.

If in Formulation mode settings option <Multiplier editing> is disabled (set to <NO>) the software automatically skips to formulation making process. If the option <Multiplier editing> is enabled (set to <YES>) the software displays a window with a keyboard for inserting the multiplier value. Mass of all formulation ingredients is multiplied by the specified value (mass of each ingredient is a product of mass saved to a formulation and multiplier value).

- 4. Press < > > button to confirm entered multiplier value, the software proceeds to formulation making process. The following parameters are displayed: selected formulation name, the first ingredient name, ingredient number, mass to be weighed and target mass.
- 5. Load the weighing pan with a container for a weighed product, wait for a stable measurement indication and carry out taring operation.
- 6. Pour as much product/ingredient in the container as required.
- 7. Press < > button to confirm, the software automatically adds the mass to the sum of weighed formulation ingredients, the next ingredient weighing begins.
- 8. With all formulation ingredients weighed a report on completed process is printed and saved to reports database (report template is editable, to edit a report template go to <Printouts>

parameter), message "Completed" is visible in the bottom bar. To proceed press < > > button.

**PROCEDURE 3** – Preparing formulation that is saved to the Formulation Database – determining target mass of complete formulation. This procedure is useful when you need to prepare a mixture with pre-determined mass, that is different from the mass resulting from summing of used ingredients.

In such case, there is no need for you to carry out complex calculations of ingredients' mass. The software adjusts mass of each ingredient in relation to pre-defined target mass of the complete formulation.

### Following the prompts:



- 2. List of formulations is displayed, select the formulation that is to be carried out.
- 3. Press < Masa ? Formulation with target mass> button.
- 4. Window with an on-screen keyboard for entering target mass of a mixture is displayed.
- 5. Enter the target mass value and press < > button to confirm, the software proceeds to formulation making process. The following parameters are displayed: selected formulation name, the first ingredient name, ingredient number, mass to be weighed and target mass. Mass of each ingredient is automatically recalculated (proportionally) to the value of defined target mass of the complete formulation.
- 6. Load the weighing pan with a container for a weighed product, wait for a stable measurement indication and carry out taring operation.
- 7. Pour as much product/ingredient in the container as required.
- 8. Press < > button to confirm, the software automatically adds the mass to the sum of weighed formulation ingredients, the next ingredient weighing begins.
- 9. With all formulation ingredients weighed a report on completed process is printed and saved to reports database (report template is editable, to edit a report template go to <Printouts>

parameter), message "Completed" is visible in the bottom bar. To proceed press < > > button.




### 23. STATISTICS

Statistics> is a working mode enabling you to acquire data from series of measurements and to produce statistics using the acquired data. Settings of this function determine which data is displayed.

### **Procedure for activation of Parts Counting mode**

Go to the home screen, press pictogram, <Working modes> submenu with list of available operation modes opens. Select < Statistics> mode, home screen featuring statistics pictogram in a top bar is automatically displayed.

### Statistics mode screen.



- 1. Setup press to access balance menu
- 2. Print header press to print data declared in the header
- 3. Print footer press to print data declared in the footer
- 4. Products Database press to select products from a corresponding database
- 5. Set tare
- 6. Statistics
- 7. Add to statistics

### 23.1. BUTTONS AND INFORMATION SETUP

Buttons crucial for series of measurement:

- < PRINT> button press to trigger printout and to add measurement to statistics,
- < Add to statistics> press to add measurement to statistics, printout is not triggered.

Each working mode features automatically displayed set of default keys. The set can be modified so can be the default "INFO" field information.



#### 23.3. SERIES OF MEASUREMENT RELATED PARAMETERS

Series of measurement enables the following operations: previewing results, printing report, deleting last measurement, deleting all results in statistics.

1. Press < Statistics> button .



- 2. The following options are displayed: Result, Print, Delete last, Delete, Measurements Chart, Distribution Probability Chart.
- 3. Select:

**Print** – to print a report





**Probability distribution chart** – to make the software generate and display a chart of probability distribution for completed measurement series. The bar chart demonstrates number of identical results in a series.

# 24. PIPETTES CALIBRATION

Balance allows for pipettes calibration. In order to calibrate pipettes by means of 3Y balance you need to use dedicated balance software function or "Pipettes" PC software intended for pipettes calibration (workstation for pipettes calibration).

Prior to calibration start install pipettes calibration set inside the anti-draft chamber. The set is non-standard balance equipment.

Pipette calibration> is a working mode allowing you to determine measurement errors of piston pipettes volume, the errors can be determined either with reference to ISO 8655 standard or your requirements.

In case of calibration carried out with reference to ISO 8655 standard the errors are automatically selected for particular volume, as specified in the standard (see table of errors, ISO 8655 standard).

Pipette calibration mode enables:

- Calibrating pipettes with fixed or adjustable volume, single or multi- channel.
- Preparing a pipettes database providing the following information: pipette name, code, tested volume, etc.
- · Calculating results on the basis of:
  - Average volume of a pipette (channel)
  - Systematic error es (accuracy error)
  - Random error CV (repeatability error)
- Carrying out automated measuring procedures conditioned by pipette's type.
- Storing calibration results in a database (in a form of reports on calibration process).
- Printing reports on pipette calibration process.
- Exporting test reports.

During volume testing procedure, the software determines accuracy and repeatability errors for the tested volume.

In case of pipettes with adjustable volume, the software enables declaring up to 5 volume values (from total pipette's range) that are to be checked during calibration process.

For pipettes calibration use distilled water exclusively.

# In order to ensure the highest accuracy of pipettes calibration process, maintain the following ambient conditions at a workstation:

- Ambient temperature of a pipette, tips and liquid has to range between 20°C 25°C with change rate during the test ± 0.5°C,
- Relative humidity 50 75%,


and

 Make sure that a pipette, tips and distilled water are subjected to thermal stabilization in the weighing room. Respective standard recommends 2-hour long acclimatization period.

While calibrating pipettes use pipettes database providing you with pipette related data, parameters, tested volume, and errors values determined for specific volumes.

Prior pipette calibration process load the pipettes database with data on pipettes and calibration criteria. In order to add pipette it is necessary to enter the database first. For information on how to add pipette to pipettes database read down this user manual.

**Measurements quantity**; designed to enable determining measurements quantity for tested pipette volume (valid for each tested volume in case of a pipette with adjustable volume),

# Request serial number:

- YES a window with an on-screen keyboard is displayed, use it to enter serial number of a pipette

# Comply with ISO 8655:

 YES – the software automatically takes error values accordant with ISO 8655 standard (if other error values have been defined for a particular pipette, then on selecting <Comply with ISO 8655> parameter the specified error values are neglected and replaced by those from ISO standard) NO

# Upload ambient conditions parameters from THB module:

- YES the software automatically acquires and saves ambient conditions' parameters from a connected THB module at a right time
- NO you have to read ambient conditions (i.e. temperature, humidity and pressure) from external sensors and enter them manually both before and after calibration.

**Result control, Tare mode, Automatic footer printout, Printout mode, Printout**, for information on how to operate this functions read section 15.8. "Additional Parameters for a Weighing Process".

## 24.2. ADDING A PIPPETE TO PIPETTES DATABASE

Database of pipettes contains list of pipettes' names and other data including tested volume and errors values for a specific volume. When adding a pipette to the database, first specify its name, and then add other data on a pipette.

The software is intuitive and you are guided by means of respective prompts. In order to add pipette it is necessary to enter the database first.

#### Procedure:

- 1. Press < Databases> button, next press < Pipettes> button
- 2. Press < Add> button.

A new record is automatically added to the database, it is opened in an editing mode. Enter the necessary parameters.

# List of pipette parameters:

- Name: press "Name" field, a window for entering pipette's name opens.
- Code: enter pipette's code;
- Model: enter pipette's type;
- Tip: enter tip's name;
- Type of volume: ADJUSTABLE / FIXED;
- Nominal volume: nominal volume value;
- Minimum volume: minimum volume value, for fixed volume pipette enter <0>;
- Number of channels: specify number of pipette's channels, for a single channel pipette enter <1>;
- Type: NONE/A/D1/D2. Pipette type adheres to standard guidelines. Since error values depend on pipette's type it is necessary to set the type if calibration process is to comply with ISO 8655 standard.
- Tested volumes: press "Tested volumes" field, a window with a list of calibrated volumes opens (in case of a new pipette, the list is empty), add volume to be tested, and define error value for each tested volume:

# Procedure:

- Press < HAdd > button.
- A window with an on-screen numeric keyboard is displayed.
- Enter tested volume in [µI] and press < button for confirmation.</li>
- A new record is automatically added, the record features recommended error values.
   In order to change error values press a field with pipette volume (each field can be edited, you can enter error values of your choice).



Caution:

While in calibration process, the order of tested volumes corresponds to the order in which they are entered.



#### 24.3. PRINTOUTS

Printouts option has been designed to enable you to determine content of particular standard printouts and to define non-standard printout.

#### Standard Printout

Standard printout comprises four internal blocks, each featuring different variables. Each variable can be attributed with parameter YES – i.e. printed, or NO – i.e. not printed.



Settings for header printout, weighing printout, and footer printout are specified in section 14.5; settings for Pipettes Calibration report are presented below.

#### 24.4. PIPETTES CALIBRATION START-UP

In order to carry out pipettes calibration process you need a special adapter which is non-standard balance equipment. The adapter facilitates calibration process and/or piston pipettes check and it is intended for YA 52.3Y balance.

The adapter has been designed to minimize evaporation occurring in the course of weighing liquids. It comprises a mini weighing chamber installed inside the weighing chamber of a balance, an

evaporation ring and a dedicated weighing pan enabling to locate a measuring vessel in the very centre

Application of the adapter prevents risk of liquid evaporation during the calibration process. Compact dimensions of the adapter along with use of the evaporation ring enable maintaining high humidity rate inside the weighing chamber.

Carried out research has proved that the adapter eliminates or considerably reduces liquid evaporation process. Eliminated/reduced liquid evaporation is a key factor while calibrating piston pipettes by means of a gravimetric method.

Selecting an appropriate adapter and balance mostly depends on calibrated pipettes type.

Prior pipettes calibration start install the adapter inside the weighing chamber, next enter data relating to pipettes that are to be calibrated, include complete pipette characteristics and values of errors (see: Database of Pipettes).

Now set pipettes calibration parameters:

- Measurements quantity
- Request serial number (YES/NO)
- Operation with adherence to ISO 8655 (YES/NO)
- Upload ambient conditions parameters from THB module (YES/NO)

#### Caution:

For parameters and settings overview go to section 24.1.

# Pipettes calibration procedure:

- 1. Press < Select pipette> button.
- 2. List of pipettes is displayed, select a pipette for testing.
- 3. Pipettes calibration home screen is displayed, selected pipette name is visible in INFO field.
- 4. Press < Start> button located in the bottom bar.
- 5. With <YES> parameter set for <Request serial number> parameter a window for entering batch number opens. Enter the value, next press < bull> button for confirmation.
- 6. Window for entering ambient conditions values is displayed, read the temperature, humidity and pressure from external sensors and enter them, next press < bull button for confirmation.
  - With <YES> parameter set for <Upload ambient conditions parameters from THB module> parameter the temperature, humidity and pressure values are acquired automatically from the THB module, water temperature must be entered manually, enter it and press < button for confirmation.
- 7. Pipettes calibration home screen is displayed, tested volume and process status <In progress> are visible in INFO field. The task bar displays prompts guiding you through the process <Weighing sample C1/V1/N1>, where: C1 channel number; V1 volume number for a channel; N1 measurement number for tested volume.
- 8. Keep following the prompts until the calibration process is completed. INFO field provides you with information on the on-going process (average volume, error values).
- 9. On confirmation of the last measurement a window with ambient condition parameters is displayed again. Enter the parameters and press < > button for confirmation.
- 10. A report is generated automatically, the report is printed and recorded in pipettes calibration reports database (ambient conditions and water temperature values given on a report are average values from the process);
- 11. Press < button located in the bottom bar. For multichannel pipette message you are asked whether the process shall be continued for remaining channels. On confirmation the balance carries out calibration / testing process for the following channels. The settings remain unchanged.
- 12. You can start the following procedure for the same pipette or select another pipette form pipettes database.

# 24.5. REPORT ON COMPLETED PIPETTE CALIBRATION PROCESS

On completing the calibration process a report is generated. The report is saved to the **Pipette calibration reports>** database. The files are named by date and time (hour) of density determining process.

# 25. DIFFERENTIAL WEIGHING

Differential weighing> is a working mode enabling you to analyse changes of mass of a single sample or multiple samples.

The process is carried out by determining sample's initial mass, next the sample is subjected to different processes, as a result some sample's ingredients are either separated or added. Finally, the

sample is repeatedly weighed (differential weighing). After the final weighing, the balance determines the difference between the two mass values (initial and final).

Differential weighing mode enables you to:

- Determine a series, where each series may contain several samples
- Assign a name for each series, print or export data on a series to a connected USB flash drive;
- For each sample: determine tare value, initial mass and carry out up to five measurements for the final mass.

In order to operate differential weighing mode, first it is necessary to enter weighing series to the database, define samples in the series, next trigger the series. To create series go to series database. For more information on how to create series read further down this user manual.

#### 25.1. SUPPLEMENTARY SETTINGS FOR DIFFERENTIAL WEIGHING MODE

The supplementary settings enable adjusting the working mode to your needs and requirements. For information on how to access the settings read below.

# Procedure:

- 1. Press grey workspace.
- 2. Settings, Keys, Information, Printouts, Series and Profiles submenus are displayed.
- 3. Press <Settings> key.
- 4. The display indicates functions related to differential weighing process.

# Differential weighing process functions:

Threshold: mass value (maximum mass of a sample, e.g. filter)

**Ambient conditions:** use this function to force operator to enter temperature and humidity prior to weighing operation: <Weighing A, Weighing T+A, Taring T>

- NO value not required;
- ONLINE values taken form ambient conditions module cooperating with the balance
- VALUE values taken form device other than ambient conditions module must be entered manually.

**Maximum number of weighing records:** use this function to declare how many times final weighing <B> is to be repeated – 5 times maximum, the parameter setting is valid for all measuring series.

For overview of remaining functions go to section 15.8. "Additional Parameters for a Weighing Process".

#### 25.2. QUICK ACCESS KEYS

Each working mode features automatically displayed set of default keys. The set can be modified by assigning out-of-list quick access keys to on-screen keys. Such operation requires particular permissions level.

This section presents only those buttons that are characteristic for Differential Weighing mode.



# Weighing A

Press to start weighing initial mass <A>. The process is carried out as a separate operation.



## Weighing (T+A)

Press to start sample container taring which is next followed automatically by sample weighing (non-separable operations). On initiation you are asked to set sample's name.



#### Tare (T)

Press to start sample container taring. The process is carried out as a separate operation. On initiation you are asked to set sample's name.



# Weighing B

Press to start weighing final mass <B>. The button triggers differential weighing mode.



#### Series

Press to select a sample for which the differential weighing process is to be carried out.



## Sample

Press to select a sample for currently carried out process of a particular series.



#### Copy tare

Press to copy tare value, determined for a given sample, to all current series samples (for which the tare value has not been assigned yet).





# 25.3. ADDING SERIES TO SERIES DATABASE

Series Database comprises series and series samples. While creating a series, first set its name, next add samples. The software is intuitive and you are guided by means of respective prompts. Provide a name for each sample. To add a series go either to series database or differential weighing mode.

#### Procedure:

- 1. Press < Databases> button, next press < Series> button.
- 2. Press < Add > button, a series is added.

A new record is automatically added to the database, it is opened in an editing mode. Enter the necessary parameters.

#### List of series parameters:

- Name: press "Name" field, a window for entering series name opens.
- Code: enter series code.
- Customer: select a customer for whom the series measurements are to be carried out.

- Samples: press to view list of samples, for a new series the list is empty, add new samples. To do it press < Add > button, the sample is added automatically, its name can be edited and changed
- Number of samples: option editing disabled, the number is updated at real time by the software on adding a new sample to the series.

For each sample on the list its current differential weighing status is displayed (weighing process stage).

Newly added samples do not have any status assigned – the field is empty. The status is updated at real time after each completed weighing process stage.

#### 25.4. DIFFERENTIAL WEIGHING PROCESS EXAMPLE

Activate DIFFERENTIAL WEIGHING mode, next:


- 1. Select information to be displayed in the grey workspace
- 2. Select appropriate quick access keys
- 3. Add a series to balance's memory (a name identifies a series)
- 4. Add samples to a series (a name identifies a sample)
- 5. On adding samples return to the differential weighing home screen

#### **SELECTING** a series:

Press <SERIES> quick access key, a window with series database opens.

Enter the database, press field with series that is to be carried out.

Selected series name is displayed in the grey workspace (provided that such information is enabled to be displayed the workspace).

Press to start weighing initial mass.

# Weighing T+A

- On pressing Weighing T button, the balance searches samples list in order to find the first sample for which weighing <T> is still to be carried out. If there are no such samples the balance displays a message informing you that the operation is disabled.
- If the operation is enabled then new data on initiated process is displayed in the grey workspace. You are guided through the process by means of prompts visible either in the workspace or bottom bar.
- Load the weighing pan with a sample container and press < > button.
- · Container mass value is assigned to a sample as tare value, balance indication is zeroed, and


you are prompted to place the sample in the container. Follow the prompt and press < > button. For <Ambient condition> parameter set to <VALUE> parameter a window for entering temperature and humidity values is displayed. You can print weighed sample data, to do it press a printer pictogram located in the top bar. In order to preview data on weighing A, press <Weighing A> field:



If a given series already contains samples for which weighing A (initial mass) has been carried out you can proceed to carrying out weighing B (final mass).

# Weighing B

- On pressing Weighing B button, the balance searches samples list in order to find the first sample for which weighing <B> is still to be carried out. If there are no such samples the balance displays a message informing you that the operation is disabled.
- If the operation is enabled then new data on initiated process is displayed in the grey workspace.

#### Caution:

Next to <Weighing B> caption you can see digits 1/3 where <1> means the first measuring cycle of type B, and <3> means that <REPETITIONS QUANTITY> parameter is set to <3> parameter (3 cycles).

The software prompts you to carry out the <FIRST> cycle, out of <3> cycles, for all samples in the series for which the measurement is enabled (it is required that weighing A is already completed for the sample).

- You are guided through the process by means of prompts visible either in the workspace or bottom bar.
- If tare is assigned to a sample, then its value is displayed with '-' sign. Load the weighing pan

with a sample (if tare is assigned load the sample in a container) and press < > > button. For <Ambient condition> parameter set to <VALUE> parameter a window for entering temperature and humidity values is displayed. For <Ambient condition> parameter set to <ONLINE> parameter a window for confirmation of values taken from ambient conditions module is displayed.

#### Caution:

If <Ambient conditions> parameter for the differential weighing mode is set to <No> parameter the software skips this part of the process.

- Press < > > button to confirm ambient conditions values, differential weighing home screen is displayed, you are prompted to unload the weighing pan.
- Unload the weighing pan and press < > > button. The balance searches samples list again in order to find the next sample in the series. Follow the above procedure and weigh the next sample.
- In order to abort the process press < > button.

On completing measurements of final mass for the samples in a series, you can check the results in the series database.

To check the results, enter the database, select a series, then select samples and a specific sample for which <Weighing B> has been carried out.



Particular weighing preview mode provides you with values. Numbers referring to weighing <B> inform on the measuring cycle.

Data on a specific series can be printed or exported to a file.


#### 25.5. COPY TARE

Copy Tare option enables copying once selected tare value (in a series) to all samples which do not have tare value assigned, and for which differential weighing process (status other than Weighing B) has not been completed.

#### Procedure:



- 2. List of samples with tare values assigned is displayed.
- 3. Press tare value that is to be applied to other samples which do not have tare assigned yet.
- 4. The selected tare value is assigned automatically.




## 25.6. SAMPLE SELECTION

Sample Selection option enables selecting a sample for weighing, with use of this option you do not have to weigh samples in an order suggested by software. The option is available only after initiating a given process.

#### Procedure:

- Go to differential weighing mode, select a series, press procedure button, e.g. <Weighing A> procedure.
- 2. Press < >button:
- 3. List of samples for witch the selected procedure can be carried out is displayed.
- 4. Select a sample that is to be weighed
- 5. This option is particularly useful if a series contains a large number of samples, and you want to weigh a sample that is at the end of a series.



# 25.7. DELETING VALUES

Delete option enables deleting last weighing record added to the database. It refers to all processes in the working mode. The software enables deleting only the most recent measurement operation.

#### Procedure:

- 1. If you have saved a weighing record by mistake (sample or tare), i.e.
- wrong sample or container has been used, press < > button.
- 2. The weighing record is automatically deleted, the software returns to the previous step of the procedure.

The process can be carried out once only, otherwise respective message informing on error is displayed, deleting a record is aborted.

#### 25.8. PRINTOUTS

Printouts option has been designed to enable you to determine content of particular standard printouts and to define non-standard printout.

#### **Standard Printout**

Standard printout comprises five internal blocks, each featuring different variables. Each variable can be attributed with parameter YES – i.e. printed, or NO – i.e. not printed.



Settings for header printout, weighing printout, and footer printout are specified in section 14.5; settings for series and sample printout template are presented below.

# 26. STATISTICAL QUALITY CONTROL - SQC

Statistical Quality Control> is a working mode enabling support control of product packing process.

It enables detecting surplus or shortfall of product in a packaging. If the weighing results are stored in the database, then trend analysis can be carried out and displayed in a form of a chart.

The software provides the possibility of controlling a batch comprising up to 1000 samples.

Each completed control process is saved to the SQC database, and its results are ready for previewing in an optional moment. Each series has a determined set of parameters that are stored in the database: maximum, minimum, standard deviation and average value for each batch, etc.

SQC control process can be carried out manually (by pressing <PRINT> button for each measurement) or automatically (automatically carried out record of stable measurements).

The balances feature module for statistical control processes. It is supported by a database containing list of products with error values (<T2->, <T1->, <T1+>, <T2+>) declared for each product.

The control process is initiated automatically and completed on controlling a required quantity of samples. As a user you define how many samples are to be controlled, to do it go to SQC settings. After completed control process a final report can be generated and/or printed. Data on a control is also automatically saved to the Database of SQC Reports.

# **Control process:**

- User selection.
- Product selection,
- Control start,
- Acquiring weighing records,
- Control finish (carried out automatically when predefined number of samples is weighed batch),
- Control report print.

#### 26.1. SQC ACTIVATION

In order to activate SQC control procedure you need to have particular permissions level.

#### CAUTION!

Starting a control requires that permissions level of the logged operator is at least <user>. If a logged user or an anonymous user have access level set to <guest> parameter then on control start the software opens a message box informing on: <Unauthorized access>.

For information on logging procedure read section 8 of this user manual, for information on how to grant permissions levels read section 12 of this user manual.

#### **Procedure:**

- 1. Log in,
- 2. Set < SQC> mode parameters, for detailed information read section 26.2,
- 3. Select a product that is to be controlled (press < below) button located in the bottom bar or on the overlay), mind to select a product with correctly entered control data,

You can abort the control process at any time, to do it press > button (control stop) located in the bottom bar.

In the course of control other soft keys and function keys, the setup and help keys are locked.

#### 26.2. SUPPLEMENTARY SETTINGS FOR SQC MODE

The supplementary settings enable adjusting the working mode to your needs and requirements.

#### **SQC** functions:

**Request batch number:** use this function to force the user to enter batch number of a product prior each control procedure start.

#### Procedure:

- 1. Select <Request batch number> parameter, window with NO/YES values is displayed.
- 2. Select NO value to disable the function, select YES value to enable the function. The previous screen is displayed automatically.

**Batch number:** use this function to enter identification number for controlled products batch. **Procedure:** 

- 1. Select < Batch number> parameter, Batch Number window with an alphanumeric keyboard is displayed.
- 2. Enter the required batch number and press < > button for confirmation.

For information on remaining functions read section 15.8. of this user manual "Additional Parameters for a Weighing Process".

# 26.3. CONTROL OPERATION

#### Procedure:

- 1. Press Product> button to select product to be controlled.
- 2. Press button located in the bottom bar to initiate the control; an editing window with an on-screen keyboard opens.







# 27. PEAK HOLD

► Peak Hold> is a working mode enabling you to snap value of maximum force applied to the weighing pan during one loading. Apart from standard settings for this mode (described in the weighing mode), additional parameter has been introduced, it sets threshold value determining function activation.

# 27.1. SUPPLEMENTARY SETTINGS FOR PEAK HOLD MODE

The supplementary settings enable adjusting the working mode to your needs and requirements. For information on how to access the settings read below.

# Procedure:

- 1. Press grey workspace.
- 2. Settings, Keys, Information, Printouts and Profiles submenus are displayed.
- 3. Press <Settings> key.
- 4. The display indicates functions related to Peak Hold mode.
- THRESHOLD function determining start point for peak hold control performed by the balance software. Remember to set this threshold prior to the measuring process.

#### 27.2. MEANS OF OPERATION

#### Procedure:

- 1. Enter <PEAK HOLD> mode
- 2. Once you select the mode, the function is active.
- 3. Set the threshold in grams determining point beyond which the function starts to register maximum force apllied.
- From now on the balance registers and holds every single indication which is above the threshold, and which is higher than the result of the previous peak hold. If the software detects mass above the threshold, the highest detected indication is held on the main display and the pictogram <Max> is shown on the left over the measuring unit.



- Press button in order to print the result.
- The start of the next process of peak hold measurement is possible only after removing the

load from the weighing pan and pressing button. This causes returning to the home screen of <PEAK HOLD> mode, pictogram <Max> is automatically deleted.

# 28. PREPACKAGED GOODS CONTROLS

(disabled for standard balance versions)

Prepacked Goods Controls> is a working mode enabling realizing prepackaged goods controls (single stand control or multi-stand control) supported by a database containing products and users. A control initiated from a balance is automatically finished after a pre-set number of packages (samples) has been controlled.

Balances may connect to **E2R SYSTEM** software and form a multi-stand system (network). Each balance is an independent weighing stand and information on control progress is transmitted continuously to software. The software enables collection of real-time data from each connected balance. Control may be activated either by means of a balance or the software.

Collected data allow you to assess quality of produced prepacked goods and their conformity with:

- regulations concerning prepacked goods control of a given country;
- a company quality control system (internal control).

# Control cycle scheme:

- Select a user.
- Select a product.
- Start control.
- Acquire weighing records.
- Automatically switch off the control after a determined number of packages (sample) has been weighed.
- · Print a report on completed control.

For detailed instruction on how to establish connection with < E2R System> go to section 32.1 'Computer' of this user manual.





# 28.5. CONTROL START PROCEDURE

#### Procedure:

1. Log in, make sure your access level allows you to carry out control (for more information read section on logging of this user manual).

2. Select product with correctly entered control data.



3. Enter weighing mode parameters:

4. Remove load from the weighing pan.

- Load has not been removed from the weighing pan or if other zeroing requirements have not been fulfilled (e.g. unstable indication), balance shows message: <-Err 2>. Upon noticing <-Err 2> message unload the balance and wait until all zeroing requirements are met.
- You have not logged in or you are logged but not assigned with the right access to perform control, then message: "No authorization" is displayed.
- You have not selected the product out of database, a message: "Product is not selected" is displayed.

#### 28.6. ABORT CONTROL PROCEDURE

# **Procedure:**

1. Press (ABORT CONTROL) soft key to abort control procedure.

2. Press button to return to the ongoing control. Press button to abort control, program returns to Prepacked Goods Controls working mode.

# 28.7. ABORTED CONTROL RESTORING PROCEDURE, POWER LOSS CASE

In case of disconnection from the mains, to prevent loss of data for control being in progress, program continuously keeps records of control results.

For power loss case the software allows to complete an aborted control upon reconnection to the mains.

Remember to restart the balance when unloaded.

# 28.10. DESTRUCTIVE EMPTY-FULL AND FULL-EMPTY CONTROL MODE

In the **Destructive** control mode, for the size of product lot over 100 parts, sample set by the software for testing is always 20 parts. The other control assessing criteria are set in accordance with the law regulations.

#### Procedure:

- 1. Select a product using the list; set its parameters for destructive control and determine a measuring **batch portion**.
- 2. Start destructive control; prompts helping you to go through control process are displayed (as in case of the controls described above).

Depending on enabled control mode, the order of products to be weighed is either: "empty-full" or "full-empty".

# Caution:

It is necessary to weigh empty packages in the same order as packages filled with product. With this the software calculates mass of a load placed in its corresponding packaging correctly.

On control completion, a report is generated and saved to the balance's database.



## 29. MASS CONTROL

(not available in standard balance version)

Mass control> is a working mode enabling you to control mass of a product automatically batched (dosed) onto the weighing pan, wherein batching is carried out using balance-connected PA-02 automatic feeder. < Mass control> automatically determines quantity and controls a complete batch of tested product.

## 29.1. MASS CONTROL GLOBAL SETTINGS

### Procedure:

1. To enter < Mass control > working mode press grey workspace on balance's display,

2. Select < SETTINGS> parameter, which contains the following:

00285	Request batch number	The parameter requests a batch number before starting mass control process.
1 2 3	Batch quantity	The parameter determines quantity of a batch, i.e. number of product units to be controlled.
PRINT	Low limit	The parameter exceeding which causes accepting a measurement record by a balance.
PRINT	High limit	The parameter exceeding which causes omitting a measurement in the summary, e.g. if two parts (pills) are simultaneously dispensed on a weighing pan.
	Print report	The parameter switches on/off automatic printout of a report on completing mass control process.
	Printout	The parameter enables selecting whether on completing the control process the balance is to trigger a standard or a non-standard printout.

# 29.2. MASS CONTROL PROCESS

Before starting the mass control process carry out the following steps:

## Set batch quantity of a carried out mass control process:

- 1. Press grey workspace on a display and select **Settings** parameter.
- 2. Select < \*\*\* Batch quantity> parameter and enter quantity of units controlled in a current automatic mass control process.
- 3. Press button to confirm.

Set < Low limit> parameter. Provide value lower than weight value of the lightest controlled part. While setting the low limit value make sure that the set value prevents improper record of mass on a final report. Improper record may happen when the mass of a part is below the lightest part of the controlled batch, e.g. a half of a pill.

Set < High limit> parameter. Provide value higher than weight value of the heaviest controlled part. While setting the high limit value make sure that the set value prevents improper record of mass on a final report. Improper record may happen when the mass of a part is greater than the heaviest part of the controlled batch, e.g. two pills simultaneously dispensed onto a weighing pan. In such case, the software skips the measurements and continues mass controlling process.

Set < Dosing power> parameter. Provide value in [%] ranging from 0% to 100%.

## Set nominal mass (Mass).

**Set limits for errors:** negative - <**T1-**> (Min) and positive - <**T1+**> (Max). Provide value in % of nominal mass value.

The dosing power, mass and error parameters are to be determined for each controlled product separately.

It is impossible to determine <T2-> and <T2+> errors. Their values are doubled values of errors <T1-> and <T1+>.

## Procedure - setting control parameters:

- 1. Press **SETUP** button in the main window of **Mass control** mode.
- 2. Select < ♥ Databases > and < ♥ Products> parameters.
- 3. Select product for which batch quantity, low limit, high limit, dosing power, nominal mass and limits for errors parameters need to be set.
- 4. Set required parameters and return to the main menu.
- Select product to be controlled from the Database < ♥>.
- Press ✓ button to start automatic mass control process.
- 7. The balance automatically tares and the feeder dispenses first part onto weighing pan.
- 8. The feeder stops, weighs the first part and saves the first stable measurement result.
- 9. The indication zeroes and the feeder dispenses next part onto weighing pan.
- 10. The feeder stops, weighs the second part and saves the second stable measurement result.
- 11. The cycle repeats until all of the declared parts are checked (weighed) in the <Batch quantity> parameter.
- 12. During control process, the following parameters on the carried out control are displayed:
  - Set standard quantity
  - Product
  - Average
  - Standard deviation
  - T1- errors quantity
  - T1+ errors quantity
- 13. The measuring process for a specific batch completes.
- 14. The report is generated, saved to balance's database and printed on a balance-connected printer.

## CAUTION:


Each control process can be aborted at any moment, to do it press button. The process stops and the control cancells (no report is generated for an aborted control).

#### 29.3. PRINTOUTS

Printouts option has been designed to enable you to determine content of particular standard printouts and to define non-standard printout.

## **Standard printout:**

Standard printout comprises four internal blocks, each featuring different variables. Each variable can be attributed with parameter YES – i.e. printed, or NO – i.e. not printed.



Settings for header printout, weighing printout, and footer printout are specified in section 14.5; settings for mass control report are presented below.

You can design content of a report.

In order to specify which measurement data is to be printed on a report it is necessary to modify settings for <Weighing printout template> parameter. To enable particular measurement data printout set <YES> parameter for it.



## 30.1. PROCESSES CARRIED OUT ON DATABASES

Databases can be operated only by an authorized personnel.







Each report can be printed.

## Procedure:

- 1. Select the report and display its details.
- 3. The printer connected to balance's terminal prints the report.

Additionally, the complete database can be exported to an external file by pressing a < Export to file> button located in the upper bar.

### 30.16. AMBIENT CONDITIONS

Ambient conditions database contains parameters related to ambient conditions. Depending on balance's settings, a report may contain data on temperature, humidity and value of atmospheric pressure. If THB ambient conditions module is connected to a balance, its records are also saved.

#### Procedure:

- 1. Enter submenu < Databases>, and press < Ambient conditions > key.
- 2. Press key of a desired report record, unless it is visible on the top of the list, wind the list forward using navigating keys.
- 3. Report's name consists of date and time.

#### Caution:

It is possible to use an option for searching a report.

#### 30.17. PACKAGES

Packages database contains list of packages for which a name, code and mass value are specified. The tare value is automatically applied when a name of packaging is selected from the database during weighing process. The display indicates mass value with minus sign.

## Procedure:

- 1. Enter submenu < Databases>, and press < Packages> key.
- 2. Press < Add > key to add new packaging.
- 3. If a packaging record already exists in the database, press field with its name, and insert data on the packaging.

#### Caution:

It is possible to use an option for searching a record by name or code.

#### 30.18. WAREHOUSES

Depending on work organizing, the Database of Warehouses contains list of places used for picking up a sample for weighing or list of places to which a weighed sample was delivered. Each Warehouse has to have its name, code and description specified. While weighing process, and on selecting name of a Warehouse, it is automatically assigned to the measurement result.

## **Procedure:**

- 1. Enter submenu < Databases>, and press < Warehouses> key
- 2. Press < Add > key to add new warehouse.
- 3. If a warehouse record already exists in the database, press field with its name, and insert identifying data.

#### Caution:

It is possible to use an option for searching a record by name or code.

## 30.19. PRINTOUTS

Printouts database contains all NON-STANDARD printouts. Each printout features a name, code and a template.

## **Procedure:**


- 1. Enter submenu < Databases> and press < Printouts> key.
- 2. Press < Add > key to add new printout or edit existing one.
- 3. If a non-standard printout template already exists in the database, press field with its name, and insert identifying data.







## Example of Printout no. 2 - printout from a file

All printout templates can be designed in a form of external files, that are imported to a balance. Such file has to have an extension: \*.txt or \*.lb and contain all constant and variable data. On importing, the content of a printout template can be modified.

- 1. Design a \*.txt or \*.lb file in an optional editor.
- 2. Copy the file to a USB flash drive.
- 3. Connect the USB flash drive to balance's USB port.

- 4. Press [4] < download a printout from a file > key.
- 5. Balance's display shows data stored on the USB flash drive connected to the USB port.
- 6. Search for a file with printout template and press its name.
- 7. The printout template is automatically copied to an editing field.

## 30.20. UNIVERSAL VARIABLES

Universal Variables are a set of alphanumerical data which are combined with printouts, products or other information related to weighing. Each variable has to have its name, code and value specified.

## Procedure:



## 30.21. DATABASES MANAGEMENT

Function allows to manage database data. It comprises three options: Export weighing database, Delete databases and Delete weighments and reports.




## 30.21.1. Export Weighing Database

All carried out measurements are saved to a database and can be exported to a file using a USB flash drive.

- 1. Insert a USB flash drive to balance's USB port.
- 2. Press < Export database of weighing records to a file>, the software opens a window where export options have to be set.



3. <Data selection> parameter allows you to specify which data related to measurement are to be exported.



- 4. Set option and click <Export weighing database to a file>, software automatically exports weighing database.
  - 5. Upon completion a respective message, information on number of exported data and the file name (with file extension \*.txt) is displayed, next the software returns to the previous window.



6. You may return to a weighing procedure or proceed to other settings.

#### Caution:

If a balance software cannot identify the USB flash drive then upon entering option <Export weighings database> a message <Operation failed> is displayed.

- 7. A name of created file consists of database name and balance serial number, e.g. <Weighing date\_2602776.txt>.
- 8. Unplug the USB flash drive from the USB port.

## Template of created file:

The file is created in a form of chart, columns of which are separated with <Tab>. This allows for direct export of the file to spread sheet document <Excel>.

The chart contains the following data:



Function allows to delete data of a chosen database.

#### Procedure:

- 1. Activate < Delete databases >, a window with databases is displayed.
- 2. Select a database data of which is to be deleted.



3. Upon confirmation the software deletes data and displays a message:




4. Upon confirmation the software returns to a previous window; you may continue a weighing procedure or proceed to other operations.

## 30.21.3. Delete Weighings and Reports

Function allows to delete weighments and reports of a given database.

- 1. Activate < Delete weighings and reports > a window with a numeric keyboard is displayed.
- 2. Enter a date specifying which data is to be removed using the keyboard.
- 3. Date is given in the following form: year-month-day.



- 4. Upon confirmation of entered date all weighments and reports older than those specified by the date are removed.
- 5. Number of removed weighments and reports is displayed.



## 31. COMMUNICATION

Communication menu is located in a Parameters menu group.

It is accessed by pressing Setup key or < Setup > quick access key.

The balance enables communicating with peripheral devices through the following ports:

- 1. Press key to open < Communication> parameters.





Icon with a padlock means that the password is required. Press <Refresh> icon to search for available networks.

Press <Network status> field to check selected network parameters. The following message is displayed:



Selected network and parameters for connection are stored in the balance's memory. The software connects to the network using the stored parameters each time the balance is activated. You may change this by selecting <Ignore the network> which disconnects given network.

## 31.4. TCP SETTINGS

TCP (Transmission Control Protocol) operating in customer-server mode enables communicating two computers. Customer establishes connection on port specified by server. Follow procedure below to set port for TCP.

#### Procedure:

- 1. Enter < Communication> parameters.
- 2. Select: "ITcp / IP Port"; a <Port> window opens with on-screen keyboard.
- 3. Insert required port number and confirm by pressing key.

## 32. PERIPHERALS

Peripherals menu is located in menu Parameters. Press Setup button or <Setup icon to open it to see list of peripheral devices for cooperation with the balance.

## 32.1. COMPUTER

icon displayed in the upper bar of the main window signals active connection between a balance and a computer. < Computer> submenu enables configuring connection settings.

## Procedure:

- 1. Press key and next press "Peripheral devices / Computer" key.
- 2. Set the following parameters:
- computer port:

available options: none, COM 1, COM 2, TCP

- address
  - give address of balance connected to a computer
- continuous transmission

available options: NO, YES (printout format depends on printout template set in a balance – see next parameter).

## - interval:

parameter allows for setting printout frequency for continuous transmission. Printout frequency is set in seconds, with 0.1s accuracy. You can set frequency in a range from 0.1 to 1000 seconds for continuous transmission activated using balance and computer.

## weighing printout template

it is possible to design an individual printout send to a computer using a dedicated window with printout template. Principles on creating printouts are described in section 30.19 of this user manual.

## E2R System

E2R System performs supervision and control over all weighing processes carried out using balance. On enabling the option, the processes carried out on some of the databases are carried out only from the computer level (mode not available in balance's standard version).

#### Caution:

E2R System> can only be enabled by balance manufacturer or authorized personnel. To provide correct cooperation with E2R System continuous transmission has to be activated.

#### 32.2. PRINTER

<Printer> submenu enables:

- · Setting communication port with a printer.
- Defining printer's code page (default 1250).
- Defining controlling codes for PCL printer or EPSON label printer.
   Caution: CODES MUST BE ENTERED IN A HEXADECIMAL FORM!
- Defining printout standards.

Speed of transmission respective for a printer (See: Printer settings) must be chosen for the balance to ensure its right cooperation with a printer (diacritical signs specified for a given language). Additionally, printout and printer code pages must be identical.

Code page accordance may be obtained as follows:

- by setting the right code page in the printer (see the printer manual) respective to printout code page set in a balance; or
- by sending control code from a balance to the printer, which automatically sets the right code page (respective to code page set in a balance) in advance before execution of the data printout it is possible only for printers supplied with such option.

If there are any unexpected signs on the printout in the place of the last digit (for verified balances), then <CONTROLLING CODES> parameter has to also incorporate code of the UK signs chart: **1B5203**. In such case the <CONTROLLING CODES> parameter setting has to be as follows: controlling codes - **1B74121B5203**.

A printout standard describes <u>how to print information from databases</u>. Printout standard can be modified if insufficient. In order to check format of printout standard, print data related to e.g. product parameters – function activated on moving to <Products/Edit product> database and pressing printer icon.

Communication> submenu requires setting baud rate to compatible with the one used by barcode scanner (default 9600b/s). For detailed description of communicating the balance with a barcode scanner go to APPENDIX E of this user manual.

Test> function enables correct operation of barcode scanner connected to balance.

- 3. Scanned barcode is entered into ASCII or HEX field; result of test is displayed in the bottom part of the window.

#### When:

- <Prefix> and <Suffix> are identical for both balance settings and scanned barcode the test is <Positive>.
- <Prefix> and <Suffix> differ for both balance settings and scanned barcode the test is <Negative>.

## 32.4. TRANSPONDER CARD SCANNER

You can log in to the balance by means of:

- Inserting user's password using on-screen keyboard,
- Transponder card scanner, by approximating a registered card to the scanner.

#### Caution:

For correct balance's cooperation with a transponder card scanner set appropriate baud rate value in submenu < Communication> (default 9600b/s).

## **Transponder card scanner port**

The balance enables communicating with a transponder card scanner using the following ports:

- RS 232 (COM1),
- RS 232 (COM2).

In order to log in an operator using a transponder card scanner, first assign a number of an already registered card to a selected user in the database of operators.

- 1. Connect a transponder card scanner to a balance's port (RS 232 COM1 or RS 232 COM2), select communication port in balance settings for the transponder card scanner.
- 2. In < Communication> submenu set baud rate for compatible with the one of the transponder card scanner (default 9600b/s).

- 3. Enter operators database, go to <RFID Card no.> parameter and edit desired operator's record.
- 4. On entering editing mode in < Card no.> parameter, an editing window < Card no.> is opened with an on-screen keyboard.
- 5. Approximate the card to the transponder card scanner. The balance automatically displays number of detected card in the <Card no.> field.
- 6. Accept recognized number by pressing key and return to the weighing.

### 32.5. ADDITIONAL DISPLAY

The balance enables communicating with an additional display using the following ports:

Type of data displayed on an additional display is declared in variable **<Project>**.

- 3. Use on-screen keyboard to insert desired value of a standard, or

Balance 3Y series cooperates with WD5/3Y additional display manufactured by RADWAG.

Ensuring correct cooperation between the balance and the additional display, requires that the < Standard> parameter has a variable number set to value {140}, and the baud rate value set to 38400 bits/s for a port to which the additional display is plugged.

## 32.6. AMBIENT CONDITIONS MODULE

3Y series balance enables connecting THB module using ports COM 1 or COM 2. Enter connection address and baud rate of port to which THB module is plugged (specified on module data plate) to ensure correct cooperation between the module and the balance.

(mode not available in balance's standard version)

Balance 3Y series enables cooperation with an automatic feeder using ports:

On changing the logic status of the input system, e.g. from [0] to [1], a function that is assigned to the system is carried out. For instance:

#### Procedure:



## **34.4. VOLUME**

You can change volume of the weighing terminal loudspeaker.

#### Procedure:

- 1. Press and next press < Miscellaneous/Volume>; an on-screen keyboard is displayed.
- 2. Enter volume in percent, 100% maximum volume, 0% minimum volume (loudspeaker off).

#### 34.5. DISPLAY SLEEP MODE

You can turn on display sleeping mode.

## Procedure:

- 1. Press and next press: Miscellaneous / Display sleep mode>.
- 2. Select one of the following options: [None; 1; 2; 3; 5; 10; 15]; digit values stand for a number of minutes.
- 3. On selecting desired value program returns to the previous menu.

### Caution:

Display turns to sleep mode only when the balance is not operated (the indication on the screen remains the same). On mass change, or key on an overlay pressing the balance returns to weighing.

#### 34.6. DISPLAY BRIGHTNESS

Display brightness influences balance operation time, when the balance is powered with battery. To lengthen the operation reduce the brightness of the display.

#### Procedure:

- 1. Press and next press: Miscellaneous / Display brightness>.
- 2. Enter desired value [0% 100%]; display automatically changes brightness and the software returns to the previous menu.

#### 34.7. TOUCH PANEL CALIBRATION

Display calibration is required if the touch panel does not react correctly during operation.

#### Procedure:

- 1. Enter submenu
- 2. Select parameter < Touch panel calibration>, an editing window is displayed.
- 3. Use finger or a thin (but not sharp edged) and soft stylus to press and hold a display area occupied by a cross. After pressing the fifth cross in order, accept the changes by pressing key.

#### Caution:

The process can be aborted by pressing Esc key on an external keyboard connected to the balance's terminal.

#### 34.8. LEVEL CONTROL

3Y series balance features an Automatic Level Control system. In case of non-verified instruments, you can define the operation of Automatic Level Control system. In case of verified instruments, the settings are hidden and the balance operates in accordance with factory settings, i.e. **<Active with lock>**. Weighing process is possible only if balance is properly leveled.

## Procedure:

- 1. Enter < Miscellaneous> submenu.
- 2. Select < Level control> parameter, an editing window is displayed.
- 3. Select one of available options:
  - None level indicator is not displayed, the balance does not control level status,
  - <u>Active</u> level indicator is displayed, the balance alerts level change by changing colour of level indicator (green → level status OK., red → level status lost)
  - <u>Active with lock</u> level indicator is displayed, the balance alerts level change by changing colour of level indicator (green → level status OK., red → level status lost). If level indicator is red, the display also shows an alert no Level , and blocks weighing function until level status is restored.


#### Caution:

Balance levelling is described in section 15.3 of this user manual.

#### 34.9. SENSORS SENSITIVITY

The parameter is adjustable between 0-9, and it determines the distance from which the IR proximity sensors react.

As standard, the sensitivity is set within the range of 5 to 7.



#### Procedure:

- 1. Enter Miscellaneous> submenu.
- 2. Select **<Sensors sensitivity>** parameter, an editing window is displayed.
- Select one of available options. The selection causes immediate returning to the menu window.

#### 34.10. IR SENSORS TIMEOUT

Parameter for setting timeout of proximity sensors expressed in [ms]. The default value is <0>. When using option of motion recognition you must remember about setting <IR sensors timeout> parameter to value <500ms>.

### Procedure:

- 1. Go to Miscellaneous> submenu.
- 2. Select < Proximity sensors delay> parameter, an on-screen keyboard is displayed.
- 3. Enter value <500>.
- 4. Confirm. The software returns to menu window.

#### **34.11. AUTOTEST**



<a href="#"><AUTOTEST></a> function is designed to aid you in both assessing balance's operation and diagnosing the reasons for occurrence of errors in weighing which exceed the maximum permissible values for a given balance model.

By means of a simple, repeatable and fully documented way the function enables optimizing balance's settings to maintain the best possible repeatability and weighing time at a workstation. The main purpose of function operation is the possibility of monitoring the above mentioned parameters at optional moment and saving records from carried out tests.

The functions is divided into two modules:

- AUTOTEST FILTER
- AUTOTEST GLP

Before testing the balance controls its level status, temperature and humidity.





#### **AUTOTEST FILTER**

It is process of 10 times loading and unloading of the internal weight for all possible settings of balance's filter and value release. The test controls 2 parameters:

- Repeatability;
- Stabilization time of measurement result.

The whole testing process takes approximately 1 hour. On completing the test for all possible settings, balance displays a message with obtained results.

You are given information on optimum balance settings in present ambient conditions. The function provides data on the best possible balance settings for obtaining the highest measurement repeatability and the shortest measurement time with acceptable value of repeatability.

Test results are stored in balance memory until the balance is turned off.

Additionally the function enables:

- Printing test results
- Selecting optimum parameters from the balance's option level.

On completed autotest, a summary with results is displayed. The software automatically informs on filters settings by means of respective icons displayed by the results:



settings providing the fastest measurement (the shortest time interval for measurement performance)



settings providing the most accurate measurement (the lowest possible value of deviation for 10 measurements)



settings providing optimal measurement (the lowest value of time and deviation product)







## **AUTOTEST GLP**

The test controls repeatability of placing the internal weight and determining error of indication with reference to balance's Max capacity.

#### **Procedure:**

- 1. Two times loading of the internal weight, followed by 10 times loading of the internal weight.
- 2. Balance internal adjustment.
- 3. Calculating and storing the value of standard deviation.
- 4. In balances with automatically opened doors, door opening and closing test is carried out.

## Additionally the function enables:

- Displaying and printing a report on available printers
- Saving the report in balance's memory.

The report contains basic data on balance's parameters, ambient conditions and test results.

- Start the following AUTOTEST GLP process.
- Preview results of completed autotests, and export all saved test results as file with extension \*.csv,
- Delete all saved test results.

You can abort the process at any moment by pressing **<X>** key in the testing window.

Results of carried out autotests are displayed as a table (each line features date and time of autotest procedure and its result).

To preview detailed data of an autotest, press a specified line of the table with test results.

The parameter enables generating a special type of a file that is automatically saved upon option enabling on a USB flash drive plugged to balance's USB port.

The file is used by RADWAG service for diagnosing any potential problems occurring during balance operation.

### **Procedure:**

- 1. Plug a USB flash drive to balance's USB port.
- 2. Enter submenu < Miscellaneous>.
- 3. Select <Export system events> parameter.
- 4. The software generates a file and automatically saves it on the USB flash drive.
- 5. The generated file has to be sent to RADWAG.

## 35. UPDATE

The function contains modules which enable updating:

- Help files available from the user level
- Area of a user: APPLICATION
- Metrological parameters: main board (only administrator).

Updating process takes place automatically by loading data from a USB flash drive connected to balance's USB port.

## 37. MOVIES

Option activating instructional movie explaining how to operate balance functions.



## 45. APPENDIX E - COMMUNICATION WITH BARCODE SCANNER

- For communication with barcode scanners RADWAG balances 3Y series use RS232 interfaces and simplex transmission (one direction) without handshaking. Only two wires are required for assuring such a transmission. Therefore, used scanners have to be equipped with such interface with disabled both hardware and software handshaking.
- Both balances and scanners have the possibility of setting of transmission parameters. Both devices are required to have the same parameters set: baud rate, number of data bits, parity control, stop bits. e.g. 9600,8,N,1 – baud rate 9600 bit/s, data 8-bits, no parity control, 1 stop bit.
- Barcode scanners can send additional information apart from the expected barcode e.g. type of barcode. It is advisable to disable such information because RADWAG devices and software do not use it.
- 4. Some RADWAG systems can omit unnecessary information by using parameters that mark the beginning and the length of the code required to analyse.
- 5. Should a barcode be recognized by a balance, it needs to have some particular features. A code requires programming a characteristics prefix and suffix. In a standard accepted by RADWAG, a prefix is a sign (byte) 01 hexadecimal and a suffix is a sign (byte) 0D hexadecimal.
- 6. Most barcode scanners allow to enable/disable different barcode types.
- Programming of scanners is usually performed by scanning special barcodes or by using an external software tool.
