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#### 1. BASIC INFORMATION

#### 1.1. Intended use

5Y-series mass comparators are intended to determine mass difference between the reference weight (A) and test weight (B).

Mass comparators are usually used in weight calibration laboratories and national metrology institutes.

#### 1.2. Precautions

- Before you start using the device, please read this Operating Manual carefully and use the product as designed.
- Do not use sharp tools (e.g. knife, screwdriver, etc.) to operate the touch panel.
- The weights that you compare must be carefully positioned in the central part of a weighing pan of the mass comparator.
- Load the weighing pan with weights whose gross mass is lower than the maximum loading capacity of the mass comparator.
- In case of failure, immediately disconnect the comparator from the power supply.
- The device that is to be withdrawn from service must be disposed of in accordance with currently applicable rules of law.
- Do not use the comparator in the explosive atmosphere. The comparator is not intended for use in hazardous areas.

# 1.3. Terms of guarantee

- A. RADWAG undertakes to repair or replace the components that prove defective in terms of manufacture or design.
- B. Specification of defects of unclear origin and determination of elimination methods can only be done in cooperation with representatives of the manufacturer and operator.
- C. RADWAG does not take responsibility for any damage or loss arising from unauthorised or wrong performance of production or servicing processes.
- D. The guarantee does not cover the following:
  - mechanical damage arising from wrong operation of the mass comparator as well as thermal, chemical damage, or damage caused by atmospheric discharge, overvoltage in the power network or other random event,
  - damage to the mass comparator, when used at variance with intended use,
  - damage to the mass comparator when the service centre declares violation or damage to the mark that secures structure of the mass comparator against opening,
  - damage caused by liquids and natural wear,
  - damage to the mass comparator due to wrong adaptation or power network defects,
  - damage arising from measuring mechanism overloading,
  - maintenance works (mass comparator cleaning works).
- E. The guarantee cover is lost when:
  - repair is entrusted to an unauthorised service centre,
  - the service centre finds interference of unauthorised people into mechanical or electronic structure of the mass comparator,
  - other version of the operating system is installed,
  - the mass comparator does not have company securing marks,
- F. Detailed terms of the guarantee can be accessed in the maintenance sheet.

#### 1.4. Supervision of metrological parameters of the mass comparator

Metrological properties of the mass comparator must be checked by the operator at prearranged fixed intervals. Frequency of checking is determined by factors of the environment which the mass comparator works in, types of comparison processes as well as the quality of supervision system.

#### 1.5. Information in the manual

Carefully read the operating manual before you plug in and switch on the mass comparator, even you are experienced in working with such devices. The manual includes all information required for suitable use; adherence to guidelines showed in the manual is a guarantee of proper and reliable work of the mass comparator.

# 1.6. Staff training

The mass comparator must be used and supervised only by people trained on its use and experienced in using such devices.

#### 2. TRANSPORTATION AND STORAGE

#### 2.1. Delivery inspection

Inspect the packaging and device for any signs of exterior damage immediately after the delivery. If you can find any damage, contact the manufacturer's representative.

#### 2.2. Packaging

Please keep all elements of the packaging in order to use them in case it is potentially necessary to transport the mass comparator in the future. Only the original packaging of the mass comparator can be used for shipping. Before you pack the product, disconnect all cables and remove moving parts (weighing pan, covers, inserts). Put all elements of the mass comparator into the original box and secure against transport damage.


#### 3. UNPACKING AND INSTALLATION

# 3.1. Installation place, place of use

- Store and use the mass comparator in rooms that are free from vibrations and shocks, and free from draughts and dust.
- The room temperature must range from +15 °C to +30 °C and its fluctuations must not exceed 0,5°C/12h.
- The relative humidity must range from 40% to 60% and its fluctuations must not exceed 2%/4h.
- The mass comparator must be positioned on a wall bracket or stable table that is not subject to vibrations, away from sources of heat.
- Special attention must be paid to magnetic properties of test weights as a strong magnet is a part of the mass comparator. Their magnetic power must be zero.


# 3.4. Unpacking

Slash a protective tape. Take the mass comparator out of the factory box. Take all elements of the device out of accessories box.

Before you start installing the mass comparator, read the manual carefully in order to properly prepare the device for operation, as per steps described in the document.


# Note:

All steps must be taken carefully and gently in order not to damage the mass comparator mechanism.



After placing the comparator in the place of use, do as follows:

- 1. Put the weighing pan on (1).
- 2. Fix 4 handles (2) and screw them (3) to the weighing pan (use screws).



- 3. Connect the head (4) to the port at the back of the balance
- 4. Connect the AC power adapter.

# 3.4. Mass comparator cleaning

#### Note:

If you clean the weighing pan after it has been installed, you may damage the mass comparator.

- 1. Disassemble the weighing pan and other moving pieces of the mass comparator. Be careful when taking these actions in order not to damage the mass comparator mechanism.
- 2. Use a small keyboard cleaner to remove dust from the weighing chamber, as far as possible.

# Glass elements cleaning:

Depending on the type of dirt, a suitable solvent must be chosen. Never immerse glass in strong alkaline solutions as it may get damaged under their influence. It is forbidden to use abrasive agents.

In case of any organic residues, use acetone. You can use water and detergent in another step. In case of non-organic residues, use diluted acid solutions (soluble salts of the hydrochloric acid or nitric acid) or bases (mostly sodium base, ammonium base).

ACIDS are removed with basic solvents (sodium carbonate), while BASES with acid solvents (mineral acids of various concentration).

In case of stubborn dirt, use a brush and detergent. Avoid detergents whose molecules are large and hard and likely to scratch the glass.

To finish with, carefully rinse the glass with distilled water.

Always use soft brushes with a wooden or plastic grip to avoid scratching. Do not use wire brushes or brushes with a wire core.

Rinsing is necessary to make sure all residues of soap, detergents and other cleaning agents are removed from the glass produce before their are reinstalled on the balance.

After initial cleaning, glass elements must be washed under running water, and distilled water at the end.

It is not advisable to dry the glass with a paper towel or under a stream of forced air because it may supply the glass elements with fibres or other dirt, and eventually result in wrong weighing indication.

Do not use electric driers for measuring glassware.

After washing, glass elements are usually put on the shelf for drying.

#### Powder-coated elements cleaning

The first step must be to clean with a slightly wetted large-pore sponge to remove loose and major dirt

Do not use abrasive agents.

If that proves insufficient, use a suitable cloth and water-cleaning agent solution (soap, dishwashing liquid) to clean the surface. When doing so, apply a regular pressure of the cloth against the surface.

Never dry clean with a detergent itself as it may damage the coating – use a large amount of water or water-cleaning agent solution.

# Aluminium elements cleaning

To clean aluminium, use products that contain natural acids. Feel free to choose distilled vinegar or lemon. It is forbidden to use abrasive agents. Avoid rough brushes as they may easily scratch the aluminium surface. A soft microfibre cloth will be the best choice.

While cleaning polished surfaces, make circular movements. After removing dirt, polish the surface with a dry cloth to dry it off and make it glow.

# Stainless steel elements cleaning:

While cleaning stainless steel elements, follow the table below. The table shows types of pollution and pollutant elimination methods.

Fingerprints	Wash with a spirit or solvent.		
	Wash with pure water and wipe it dry.		
Oils, fats, greases	Wash with organic solvents and then with warm water and soap or soft		
	detergent. Rinse with pure water and wipe it dry.		

Stains and temperature	Wash with a soft scrubbing detergent. Gently clean as per the direction of the surface structure.				
decomposition	Rinse with pure water and wipe it dry.				
Strong	Gently clean as per direction of the surface structure.				
discolouration	Rinse with pure water and wipe it dry.				
Traces of rust	Moisten with an oxalic acid solution and leave for about 15-20 minutes. Next wish with warm water and soap or soft detergent. Rinse with pure water and wipe it dry.				
Paints	Wash with a paint solvent, and then with warm water and soap or soft detergent. Rinse with pure water and wipe it dry.				
Scratches on the surface	Gently polish with an unwoven fabric (iron-free) as per direction of the surface structure. Then wash with soft scrubbing detergent. Rinse with pure water and wipe it dry.				

### ABS elements cleaning:

To clean dry surfaces, it is necessary to use clean cellulose or cotton cloths that do not leave streaks and do not dye. You can also use a solution based on water and cleaning agent (soap, dishwashing liquid, window washing agent). While cleaning the surface, apply a regular pressure of the cloth against the surface. Wipe the surface in question and dry it off. Cleaning can be repeated, if necessary.

In case of hard-to-remove dirt, such as residues of glue, tar, polyurethane foam, etc., you can use special cleaning agents based on mixture of aliphatic hydrocarbons that does not dissolve materials. Before you use the cleaning agent, it is advisable to perform usability tests covering all surfaces. Do not use abrasive agents.

#### 3.6. Connection to the network

The mass comparator can be connected to the network only with the use of the original power adapter (supplied). The rated voltage of the power adapter (given on its rated plate) must comply with the rated voltage of the network.

To power the mass comparator, insert the power adapter into the mains socket while the pin of the power adapter into the port located at the back of the mass comparator housing.

#### 3.7. Mass comparator temperature stabilisation time.

Before you initiate measuring, wait for the mass comparator to stabilise thermally.

With regard to mass comparators that before connection to the network were stored at a substantially lower temperature (e.g. in winter), the acclimatisation and heating time is about 12 hours. While the mass comparator is stabilising thermally, the indication displayed may change. It is advisable to make sure the potential surrounding temperature fluctuations are minor and slow in the place of using the mass comparator.

# 3.8. Connection of additional equipment

Only the additional equipment that is recommended by the mass comparator manufacturer can be connected. Before you connect the additional equipment or change the aforesaid equipment (e.g. printer, PC, USB-type computer keyboard or additional display unit), unplug the comparator. After connecting devices, repower the comparator.

#### 4. ACTIVATION OF THE MASS COMPARATOR

Supply power to the balance.

NOTE: The balance is equipped with two ports for a power adapter. One port is located in the readout head, and the other at the back of the weighing mechanism housing. The balance can be supplied with power from both the head and balance mechanism, but it is forbidden to do it from both at a time, with the use of two power adapters. Otherwise you may damage the balance and power adapters.

- After a while the operating system and RADWAG software will start loading. The start-up procedure will be accompanied by a flashing signalling light and LED lights at the lower frontal part of the readout head.
- Once the start-up procedure has ended, a home screen will automatically open in other balances.
- The balance activates with the unlogged operator (no user) to initiate operation. You must log in (login procedure will be described further in the manual).

**Note:** The balance must be activated without any load – with an empty weighing pan.

——— In the case of verified balances, as per provisions of EN 45501 standard, the mass value displayed must not be below -20e. Therefore, if the value is lower than the aforesaid value, the main display shows: **Lo mass**>.

If this is the case, zero the balance by pressing

If the program crashes during operation, perform the so-called hard reset. To do so, press the balance head button and keep it pressed for about 5 seconds.

The program will restart and the device will reactivate.




# 5. PROGRAM STRUCTURE

The main menu of the program has been divided into functional groups. Each group includes parameters grouped by themes. The description of each group can be found further in the manual.


# **List of menu groups - Parameters**

#### 6. PROGRAM WEIGHING WINDOW




# The home screen of the application can be divided into 5 fields:

 The upper part of the screen shows information on a currently used working mode, logged user, date, time, active connection to PC.



• Below is a window that shows the weighing result and balance levelling status.



The field contains additional information related to current activities.



#### Note:

The information included in this field is freely programmable. The way of defining will be described further in the manual.

The on-screen functional keys are presented below:



#### Note:

The balance operator is allowed to define on-screen functional keys. The way of defining will be described further in the manual.


Fixed functional keys can be found at the bottom of the screen:



#### 7. LOGIN

In order to gain full access to user parameters and database edition, the balance operator must log in as **<Administrator>**.

To do so, expand the menu in the upper part of the screen.



# First login:

• After you have expanded the top menu, press the field with **<Log in>** inscription. The operator base window with **<Admin>** item will pop up.



• By default this operator is not assigned any access password. If you select it, the program home screen will be automatically displayed.

NOTE: After the first logging, at first enter operators and assign them relevant permission levels and unique access passwords (procedures will be described further in the manual, see point 11 and 13.2).

During another login, select the operator from the list, enter the password to make the program work for the specific operator as per its permission level.


#### Logout:

- Expand the menu in the upper part of the screen and press the field with <>>:
- •After collapsing the top menu in the upper bar of the screen, the logged operator's name will turn into **<Not logged in>**.

#### 8. NAVIGATION IN THE MASS COMPARATOR MENU

It is very intuitive and easy to navigate in the menu of the weighing program. Thanks to the display with a touch panel, you can easily use the program. When you press the on-screen button or field in the screen, you activate the assigned operation or function.

# 8.1. Balance keyboard



#### 8.2. Voice commands

The balance program allows performing several operations via voice commands. These are the following operations: tarring, zeroing, print/save measurement. The commands must be expressed in English, in a suitable sequence. See below for the structure of particular commands.

Tarring: ellipsis [please] (tare | tar | terre) [the] device

Zeroing: ellipsis [please] zero [the] device

Print/Save: ellipsis [please] save [the] (mass | measurement | mass measurement)

The method of expressing the command: black text is obligatory, green text may be expressed but does not need to, red text – one of them must be obligatorily expressed e.g.: for the Print command: ellipsis save mass.

#### Procedure:


1. Place the < >> voice command activation key on the button bar (the method of adding buttons is described further in the manual).



- 2. Press < >> button.
- 3. The voice command recognition procedure will be initiated and the operator will be informed about it through messages.



- 4. Express the command as per the description above.
- 5. If the command is expressed correctly and the program can recognise the command, a message will be displayed and the command will be automatically executed.



# 8.3. Return to weighing function

Any changes entered into the balance memory are automatically saved in the menu after returning to the home screen.

# Procedure:

- Press \_\_\_ button a couple of times to return to the main screen of the balance.
- Press in field in the upper bar to return to the home screen instantly.

# 9. COMPARISON

Place the test weight on the weighing pan of the mass comparator. When ightharpoonup marker is displayed on the left side of the screen, you can read the weighing result.

You can save/print the weighing record out by pressing <PRINT> key:

• in verified mass comparators – only stable weighing result ( ▶ marker)

# 9.1. Selection of comparison unit

It is possible to change the comparison unit by pressing the unit displayed in the weighing window, just next to the measurement result. Click the unit to display a list of available units. Select any of the units to make the program automatically recalculate the value of the unit you have chosen.



In non-verified mass comparators, all units out of the International System of Units (SI) are available.

# 9.2. Principles of correct comparison

To guarantee a long-term use and correct measurements of masses of compared weights, please do as follows:

 Activate the mass comparator without any loads on the weighing pan of the mass comparator



# 9.3. Mass comparator levelling

The mass comparator has been equipped with the AutoLEVEL system that allows monitoring the mass comparator level. Thanks to this solution, you can continuously keep track of the mass comparator level while it is operating, which is signalled in the top right corner of the screen. In case the level changes, the system informs you about it in the display: by changing the position of the level indicator and/or by sounding the alarm and showing the mass comparator level setting window.

# Mass comparator levelling procedure:

- Press < > levelling icon in the top right corner of the screen.
- The display of the balance will show the levelling control panel.
- Level the balance by turning its legs in the way showed in the screen with pulsing pictograms
   level point will move towards the centre of the circle.
- When the point gets into the inner circle of the 'level view', its colour will change from
   red into green 

   the balance has been levelled correctly.

#### Note:

The balance is equipped with the Automatic Level Control unit. You can see how it works further in the manual.

# 9.4. Mass comparator zeroing

In order to zero the mass value, press button. The screen will show the zero value of the mass, together with the following symbols: +0+ and -. Zeroing is tantamount to determination of a new zero point which is treated by the mass comparator as zero. Zeroing is possible only when the screen values are stable and when the weighing pan is loaded.

# 9.5. Mass comparator tarring

#### Note:

It is impossible to tare the negative value. An attempt to tare the negative value will cause the **Err3** error message to pop up. This being the case, zero the mass comparator and tare again.

# **Manual tarring**

#### Procedure:

- Press the quick-access button in any working mode.
- A numerical keyboard will be displayed.
- Enter tare and press
- The comparator will return to the comparison mode and the screen will show the tare value with

# Tare deleting

You can delete the tare showed in the screen by pressing the ZERO key in the mass comparator housing or by using <Disable tare> programmable key.

**Procedure 1** – after removing the tarred load from the weighing pan:

- press the ZERO key,
- NET marker will be deleted, a new zero point of the mass comparator has been determined.

**Procedure 2** – when the tarred load is on the weighing pan:

- press the ZERO key,
- NET marker will be deleted, a new zero point of the mass comparator has been determined.
- when the tare value is higher than 2% of the maximum load, the screen will show the following message: Err- (operation unfeasible).

**Procedure 3** – when the tarred load is on the weighing pan or after removing the tarred load from the weighing pan:

• press <Disable tare> programmable key



- NET marker will be deleted,
- the screen will show the tare value.
- press <Restore tare> key to restore the recently used tare value.

# 9.6. Working mode activation procedure

To change the working mode:

Expand the menu in the upper part of the screen.



- •Press <Working mode> item
- •The screen will show a list of modes.
- •Select the name of the mode that is to be used, and the balance will automatically activate the mode you have chosen.

# 9.7. Parameters related to working mode

Every working mode is related to programmable parameters that determine its operation. How to access these parameters:


1. Expand the left side menu.



- 2. The following menu will be showed in the screen:
  - <Settings> additional options related to the mode.
  - Keys> defining quick-access keys.
  - <Information> selection of information to be showed in the Info field.
  - <Printouts> selection of the type and content of printout.
  - <Profile> settings for the profile
- 3. Press a relevant menu and select the element to be modified.

The description of basic parameters that are in the <Settings> menu can be accessed in the point 13.7 *Additional parameters related to weighing*. Other parameters related to specific modes are described under presentation of these modes.

# 9.8. Quick-access keys, proximity sensors



The operator can quickly return to the default arrangement of keys in the lower bar of the screen by pressing key in the top right corner of the window.

The operator can define 7 keys that can be visible in the lower bar of the screen.


Assignment of the function to the key causes a relevant icon to show up. The icon is displayed in the lower navigation bar of the home screen. Availability of keys depends on the

working mode. The list of keys can be accessed in the SUPPLEMENT B to the manual. It is the so-called quick-access key for the most frequent operations.


Each working mode is assigned a default arrangement of keys. To quickly restore the default arrangement, you need to select <Default key arrangement> function.

Another way of adding or changing the key is to press the field in the key bar and keep it


pressed for about 3 seconds.



The program will display the window with the following keys automatically.



Press the key that is to be added and the program will display the home screen again. The key you have selected will appear in the place of activation.



**Note:** The operator can gain access to the operating manual saved in the balance memory.

To use this function, set help key in the key bar.

# 9.8.1. Proximity sensors

The balance is equipped with two proximity sensors that allow controlling the operation of the balance with no need to press buttons on the housing or touch screen.

The program can recognise four motions near sensors:

- 1. Putting the hand close to the left sensor < Left proximity sensor >.
- 2. Putting the hand close to the right sensor < **Right proximity sensor**>.

# 9.9. Working mode - Comparator

The **<Comparator>** working mode lets the operator determine standard deviation for a series of measurements. The standard deviation is determined on the basis of a series of ABBA, ABA or AB measurements, where:

A – control mass standard (reference weight)

B – test mass weight

The number of measurements for the series and ABBA, ABA or AB method is set by the operator in **<Working Modes>** parameters group in **<Comparator>** submenu.

# Results are calculated by the program as per the tables and equations below:





# 9.10. Selection of the measurement method in the mass comparator

The settings of the working modes of the mass comparator have special functions adapted to the customer's specific needs. The working modes can be configured in **Working modes**> submenu. To gain access to **Working modes**> submenu, expand the right side menu.



Next press < **Parameters** > key and the working mode edition box will be displayed:



To change the type of weight calibration method, press < Method> key and select the desired method:

- ABBA
- ABA
- AB

# 9.11. Declaration of the number of cycles

#### Procedure:

- Select <Comparator> and press <Parameters>
- Press <Number of cycles> key and enter the desired number of measurement cycles, then press to approve.

# 9.12. Declaration of the number of test run cycles

#### **Procedure:**

- Enter **<Working Modes>** parameters group,
- Select: **<Comparator>**, then **< Parameters >** and **<Number of test run cycles>**. Then the **<Number of test run cycles>** edition box with the on-screen keyboard will be displayed.
- Enter the desired value and press
- key to confirm.

# 9.13. Start delay

- Enter < Working Modes > parameters group,
- Select: **<Comparator>**, then **< Parameters >** and **<Start delay>**. The setting selection edition window will be displayed afterwards,
- Enter: YES when comparison starts, the window will be displayed. You need to enter the time by which the start is to be delayed. When the period of time has passed, the comparison procedure will be initiated automatically, NO the procedure starts instantly after initiation. After selecting the relevant option, the selection window will be closed automatically and the description by the parameter will be modified.

#### 9.14. Tare mode

#### Available options:

#### SINGLE:

the value remembered after you press the TARE key once. If you press again, you set a new tare value. Selection of the product or box which the tare value is assigned to causes the previous tare to be deleted.

# • TOTAL OF CURRENT:

summing up currently entered tare values for the product and box (arising from selection of the product and box from the database), with a possibility of adding the manually entered tare value to the total. After you set the tare value for the product or box again, the manually entered tare value will be disabled.

# •TOTAL OF ALL:

summing up all subsequently entered tare values.

#### •AUTOTARE:

# Principle of operation:

Every first measurement is tarred when the stable value is obtained. The screen will show the NET inscription and then you can specify the net mass. After removing the load and returning to the autozero zone, the program will delete the tare value automatically.

# • EVERY MEASUREMENT:

possibility of tarring before every measurement in the series.

# 9.15. Automatic printout of the footer/C-label

#### Available options:

MODE – None – manual printout of the footer.

Total of measurements – the footer can only be printed out when the value of the mass entered in <Threshold> parameter is exceeded.

Number of measurements – the footer can only be printed out when the specific number of measurements (series) in <Threshold> parameter is made.

THRESHOLD – specification of the threshold value that determines printout of the footer.

For <Total of measurements> option, the value will be defined in the mass unit [g], and for <Number of measurements>, the value will be unnamed, specifying the number of measurements.

# 9.16. Printout / approval mode

PRINTOUT/ APPROVAL KEY (manual control)

Never – inactive printout.

First stable — the first stable measurement is recorded. Every stable — all stable measurements are accepted.

Every – printout of all measurements (stable and unstable),

in verified balances only stable results (as in the <Every

stable> setting).

AUTOMATIC MODE

Never – inactive printout.

First stable — the first stable measurement is recorded after being put on

the weighing pan, another stable measurement will be recorded only after removing the load from the weighing pan, when the readout value 'drops' below the threshold value and

another load is placed on the weighing pan.

Last stable — the last stable measurement that occurred before the load

was removed is recorded. It is recorded after removing the load

from the weighing pan and after the readout value 'drops'

below the threshold value.

With interval — if you select this option, you activate operation of the

automatic printout and record of balance readout in the WEIGHING base cyclically with a specific interval.

The interval can be set in [min] in the <INTERVAL> parameter.

The range of intervals is from 1 s to 9h 59min 59 sec.

**NOTE:** Every result (stable and unstable when the balance is non-verified, and only stable when the balance is verified) is printed out and remembered.

The automatic operation with the interval starts upon enabling the option. The first stable result that is higher than the THRESHOLD value is printed out and remembered in the first place. Further measurements are printed out with a frequency of the INTERVAL. To end the automatic operation with the interval, disable the option.

THRESHOLD:

the mass value for automatic printout is set in grams.

INTERVAL

the frequency of recording the value for automatic operation with interval

#### Statistics

It contains settings for statistical calculations during operation.


Available options:

- Global: statistical calculation are performed for all subsequent measurements, irrespective of the product you select
- Product: statistical calculations are performed for particular products

# 9.17. Printouts

The <Printouts> menu consists of three setting units. The first unit is standard printouts: <Header printout template>, <Weighing record/label printout template>, <Footer/C-label printout>. The second unit is non-standard printouts: <Printout/label base>, and the third unit refers to parameters that allow setting the printing quantities: header, weighing record and footer after a single click of the printout call key.

#### ← Printouts



**Standard printout** comprise 3 sections featuring numerous variables. Set for each variable that is to be enabled on the printout, set for each variable that is to be excluded from the printout.

To quickly change the settings press buttons located in the top right-hand corner.

# Non-standard printout

- 2. Press <Add> key to open another window with the following data: Name/Code/Template.
- 3. Enter the name and code for the printout.
- 4. Press <Template> key.
- 5. The screen will show the field with keyboard for edition of the printout.
- 6. Using the keyboard, you can design the printout; the printout can include texts and variables.

# Note:

- The operator can add printouts from the external memory by importing already configured texts with the use of a USB port.
- The name of the printout is ONLY NAME and does not represent its content.
- The method of designing a non-standard printout has been described in the point 13.10 <Printouts>.



# 9.19. Management of information in the screen



The operator can quickly change selection of information to be displayed, using keys in the top right corner of the screen.

The information related to weighing is showed on the left side of the central part of the screen.



You can put 6 pieces of information at the most there. If you have chosen more than 6, the first 6 will be displayed.

For each piece of information, there are two options available:

- visible informationinvisible information.
  - 9.20. Comparison basic procedure
  - 1. When you are in the home screen, press key in the bottom left corner of the screen.
  - 2. Select databases.
  - 3. Enter Wzorce odniesienia reference weights and define reference weights

- 4. Return to the database, go to wzorce badane test weights and define test weights.
  5. Return to the database, define Plany komparacii comparison plans.
  6. Return to the home screen, and press comparison plans in the functional key bar, and then select the comparison plan.

- 8. To start comparison while being in the home screen, press the procedure will be initiated instantly as per the previously assigned parameters.

In the comparator, you can calibrate various weight values during one comparison plan. To do so:

- 1. Define was reference weights and was test weights, and enter the mass of weights to make the comparator adjust internal ballasts automatically.
- 2. Define Plany komparacji comparison plan.
- 3. Return to the home screen and press comparison plans in the functional key bar, and select the comparison plan.
- 4. Position reference and test weights on the loading pan.

#### 10. CALIBRATION

Mass comparators are equipped with an automatic calibration (adjustment) system so that suitable measuring accuracy is guaranteed. The access to calibration control functions is given in <CALIBRATION> menu.

#### 10.1. Internal calibration

The internal calibration utilises the mass inside the mass comparator. The <Internal calibration> key causes the calibration procedure to start instantly. When it is over, the mass comparator displayes a message on the end of the process and its status.

#### Note:

The mass comparator calibration requires stable conditions (no air blows, no floor vibrations), and the calibration procedure must be performed when the weighing pan is empty.

#### 10.2. External calibration

The external calibration is performed with the use of an external standard of a suitable precision and mass, dependent upon the type and loading capacity of the mass comparator. The procedure is semi-automatic while further stages signalled with messages in the screen.

#### Note:

The external calibration is possible only with regard to mass comparators that are not subject to compliance (verification) assessment.

#### Procedure:

- Enter <Adjustment> submenu, next select <External adjustment> option.
- Message to remove weight is displayed. Unload the weighing pan and press button. The balance determines start mass, message: Start mass determination is displayed.
- Upon completed start mass determination, message ordering you to load the weighing pan is displayed. Load the weighing pan with weight of respective mass value, and press
- For some balance types, the next message is displayed. Load the weighing pan with weight of subsequent mass value, and press button.

Upon completed procedure, unload the weighing pan and press button to confirm. Balance returns to the weighing process.

#### 10.3. Operator's calibration

The operator's calibration can be performed on the basis of any standard whose mass exceeds 0.15 of the maximum loading capacity to the size of the maximum loading capacity of the mass comparator. The calibration procedure is similar to the external equivalent, yet here comes a window for declaration of the standard mass value before the procedure starts.

#### Note:

The operator's calibration is possible only with regard to mass comparators that are not subject to compliance (verification) assessment.

To initiate the procedure, enter <Calibration> submenu and press: <Operator's calibration> key, and then follow the instructions showed in the mass comparator screen.

#### 10.4. Calibration test

The <Calibration test> function allows comparing external calibration results with the value entered in the factory parameters. Such a comparison allows specifying mass comparator sensitivity drifts in time.

#### 10.5. Automatic calibration

In this menu, declare the factor that determines the time of initiation of the automatic calibration. The following options are available:

- None automatic calibration is inactive.
- Time calibration is performed at intervals declared in <Automatic calibration time> menu.
- Temperature calibration is performed only when the temperature changes.
- Both temperature change and time determine when the automatic calibration is to begin.

#### 10.6. Automatic calibration time

The <Automatic calibration time> parameter specifies time intervals for the automatic internal calibration of the mass comparator. The period of time is defined in hours, from 1 to 12 hours.


To set the automatic calibration time, please do as follows:

- Press <Automatic calibration time> key.
- Based on the menu, select the period of time (given in hours) that is to pass from the last calibration to perform another internal calibration.

# 10.7. Report printout

The <Report printout> parameter specifies if the calibration report is to be printed out automatically after the calibration is finished.

To print the report out automatically, set the active printout function of the parameter.



#### 10.9. Calibration history

It contains all mass comparator calibrations. The record is automatic. Every recorded calibration contains basic data on the process. From this menu, you can display a list of calibrations recorded. Every report can be printed out.

To print the calibration report out, enter <Calibration> submenu and then <Calibration history>.

Select the calibration you wish to print out and press <



#### Note:

If the mass comparator memory is full, the oldest record in the list will be deleted automatically.

If internal procedures require complete documentation for all calibrations, the list with records must be periodically printed out and archived.

#### Searching for the completed calibration

It is possible to search for information on the completed calibration: press completion date.





# 11.1. Password settings

The menu group allowing you to specify the password complexity for balance operators.

# Unlogged operator's permission

The administrator can assign permission levels to the balance operator who has not logged in (the so-called anonymous user).

**Note:** If **<Guest>** is chosen, the unlogged operator will not be entitled to change settings of the program.

## **Automatic logout**

The option allowing you to activate the automatic logout upon expiration of the specific period of time, given in minutes, if the balance is not used.

By default this option is inactive in the balance (setting: <None>).

Default balance settings allow the operator logged as an **Administrator** to make changes to settings of particular databases. Depending on requirements, these permission levels can be changed.

Similarly, you can change permission for edition of other options available in this menu.

# 11.4. Remote access password



The balance allows you to gain a remote access through a connection of the balance to the local Internet network which a PC is connected to. The **VNC Viewer** application is dedicated in this respect.

The default access password set in the program is a sequence of characters: *radwag1234*. If the operator does not intend to use the default password, he needs to set a unique access password in the aforesaid parameter.

Note: please remember a new password in order not to lose a remote access to the balance.

#### 12. PROFILES

The profile is a set of information describing:

- how a function is to work; e.g. counting details, deviations %, etc.,
- what information will be displayed during operation,
- what keys will be active,
- which units will be available,
- what criteria apply to balance speed and result stabilisation.

The balance program allows you to create numerous profiles, which in reality means that:

- every operator can create its own working environment,
- it is possible to design the mode of balance operation through keys and information that are required (work ergonomics).

To make the work with the balance easier, there are four default profiles in the program. The settings have been selected and saved for these profiles to make sure the weighing is optimal for specific expectations and conditions.

The following profiles are available:

- Fast the profile that allows you to quickly weigh any masses, regardless of the working mode. Upon the first activation, the balance launches this profile automatically. For this profile, parameters have been selected to make sure the final result of the measurement is achieved as quickly as possible,
- **Fast dosing** the profile dedicated to dosing and allowing quick mass dosage. The selection of this profile leads to automatic activation of the DOSING mode,
- **Precision** the profile dedicated to precise weighing of any masses, regardless of the working mode. For this profile, the weighing procedure is the longest but the final result is the most precise and accurate,
- User the basic profile whose filter settings have been selected to make sure weighing
  is relatively fast and precise. Selection of this profile leads to automatic activation of
  the WEIGHING mode.

**Note**: the operator can modify profile settings comprehensively, only in User profile. With regard to other default profiles (Fast, Fast dosing and Precision), modifications are limited. Every additional profile created by the operator can be modified thoroughly.

## 12.1. Profile creation

The balance administrator can create new profiles by:

- copying an already existing profile and modifying it,
- creating a new profile.

# Copying the existing profile

#### Procedure:

• Enter the main menu. To do so, press




- Next enter < > > submenu.
- Press and hold the key with the profile name that is to be copied.
- A menu will be displayed. Select <Copy> item.

- A profile called <Copy name> will be created. All settings will be identical to the settings of the basic profile.

Note: Profile operations are possible after you have logged in as Administrator.

#### 12.2. Profile structure

The following items are available in each profile:

Settings The menu allowing you to assign a unique profile name (a sequence of alphanumerical characters) and declare which mode is to be a default mode (the selected mode will always be loaded as a default mode after

selecting the profile).

**Working** The option allowing you to set options specific for particular working modes. There are such submenus as:

- Additional settings related to the mode
- Kevs
- Information
- Printouts

**Readout** It contains such submenus as:

- Filter
- Result approval

- Autozero
- Autozero: Dosing
- Last digit
- Number of last digits
- Environment

#### Units

The menu allowing you to declare the start unit, additional unit, 2 defined units, and to introduce the gravitational acceleration value in the place of using balance as well as declaring availability of particular units.

# 12.2.1. Settings

#### Name

After entering this option, the screen will show a window with a keyboard. Enter the profile name and press key to confirm. The new name will apply to the profile.

## Default working mode

Enter this option and select a specific working mode as a starting mode for the profile. In case of <None> option, select the profile and the balance will keep a recently used mode.

## 12.2.2. Working modes

After entering this option, a window will be displayed with all available working modes. The operator can introduce his own settings for each mode. They will be called after selecting a specific mode.

The following parameters are available for each of the working modes:

- Settings:
  - they contain specific settings related to the working mode and universal settings, such as result control, tare mode, automatic footer printout, printout mode, printout.
- Quick-access key functions:
  - declaration of keys that will be visible in the lower part of the screen.
- Information:
  - selection of information to be displayed in the grey information field.
- Printouts:
  - selection of a type of printout or defining of the non-standard printout.

#### 12.2.3. Readout

The operator can adapt the balance to external environmental conditions (filters degree) or own needs. The <Readout> menu consists of the following items:

## FILTER (unavailable to the following profiles: Fast, Fast dosing, Precision)

Before it is displayed, every measuring signal is electronically processed in order to achieve correct parameters, typical of the stable signal, that is ready for readout.

To a certain extent the operator can influence processing by selecting a suitable FILTER. Scope of selection:

very fast, fast, medium, slow, very slow.

Choosing the filtering level, you need to consider real working conditions of the balance. For very good conditions, you can set the medium or fast filter, and for unfavourable: slow or very slow filter.

#### Note:

- for precise balances, it is advisable to choose fast + medium filters,
- for analytical balances and microscales, it is advisable to choose medium ÷ very slow filters.

Result approval (option unavailable to profiles: Fast, Fast dosing, Precision) It determines the time of displaying the stability mark for a measurement result.

You can set one of three result approval options:

• fast, fast + precise, precise.

**Note:** How quickly the stable result is achieved depends on the type of filter used and specific result approval.

## **Autozero function**

The task of this function is automatic control and correction of the zero readout. When the function is active, subsequent results are compared in fixed time intervals. If these results differ by the value smaller than the declared scope of AUTOZERO, e.g. 1 unit, the balance will automatically reset itself and stable result marker -  $\longrightarrow$  and zero marker  $\rightarrow$   $0 \leftarrow$  will be displayed. When the AUTOZERO function is active, every measurement always starts from zero. There are special cases in which this function is an obstacle to measuring. The example can be a very slow placement of the load on the weighing pan (e.g. pouring the load in); this being the case, zero indication correction unit can also correct real mass of the load.

Available values: **NO** - autozero function inactive.

YES - autozero function active.

# Autozero function: Dosing (option unavailable to the following profiles: Fast, Fast dosing, Precision)

The task of this function is default setting of the autozero in the dosing function. Available values:

**NO** - autozero becomes inactive automatically after entering the Dosing mode.

YES - autozero becomes active automatically after entering the Dosing mode.

#### Last digit

Using this function, you can disable visibility of the last decimal place in the exposed weighing result. The function offers three settings:

Always: all digits are visible.

- Never: last digit of the result is disabled and is not displayed.

When stable: last digit is display only when the result is stable.

## Number of last digits

Using this function, you can declare the number of hidden last result digits. The function offers three settings and works in connection with <Last digit> option:

- 1: last digit of the result.

2: last two digits of the result.

**3:** last three digits of the result.

#### **Environment**

This parameter refers to the environment and conditions which the balance is working in. If environmental conditions are unstable, it is advisable to change the parameter into Unstable. By default this parameter is set as Stable.

The Stable setting causes the balance to work much faster. In effect the weighing time is a way shorter when compared to the Unstable parameter.

Unstable; Stable.

#### 12.2.4. Units

The operator can declare a start unit and additional unit as well as two defined units for the specific profile.

# ← Units



Here, it is also possible to enter the gravitational acceleration value in the place of using the balance. It is required for using the mass value in [N].

# The defined unit has the following:

- o Pattern (defined unit calculation pattern): Coefficient \* Mass or Coefficient / Mass.
- Coefficient (declaration of the defined unit calculation coefficient as per the specific pattern)
- o Name (unique unit name displayed by the result
  - max. 3 characters)

# ← Custom unit 1



In case such a unit is designed, its name will be visible in the list of available units; this option is only available to non-verified balances.

## 13.1. Operations in databases

The operations in databases are only available to the authorised operator.

To edit Bases, follow the steps below:

- The relevant menu will be showed in the screen.
- Select one of the available options (available options depend on the type of base you choose).



## Selection of options:

- EXPORT the option allowing you to export data saved in the database to the
  pendrive external memory. Before you select the option, connect the memory to any
  USB port. If the program can detect the memory, it will initiate the copying procedure
  automatically. Once the copying procedure has been completed, you will see the
  window with the <Ended> message and name of the file which the data from the
  base have been saved on. Now you need to approve it.
- IMPORT the option allowing you to import data from the pendrive external
  memory. Before you select the option, connect the memory to any USB port. If the
  program can detect memory, a window with saved files will be displayed. Specify the
  file with data to be imported. Selection of the file initiates the copying procedure
  automatically. Once the copying procedure has been completed, you will see the
  window with <Ended> message. Now you need to approve it.
- OPEN the option allowing you to enter the specific database (similar when you single click the field of the base).

After entering the base you have selected, the following operations are possible (depending on the type of base):

- 1. Adding items to database.
- 2. Searching for an item in the base by name.
- 3. Searching for an item in the base by code.
- 4. Searching for an item in the database by date.
- 5. Exporting data from the base to USB mass memory.
- 6. Printing information on record in the database.

The above-stated actions are initiated through buttons located in the top right corner of the screen. Follow the messages displayed in the screen.

You can click them to add a text. After you have entered the sign, disable the signs by pressing the 'X' key.



All printout templates can be prepared as external files that can be imported to the balance. Such a file must come with \*.txt or \*.lb extension and contain all permanent and variable information. The content of such a file can be modified after importing.





## 14.1. Operations in databases

**Report-based operations** are available only to the authorised operator.

To edit Bases, follow the steps below:

- Press and hold the field with base icon.
- A relevant menu will be showed in the screen.
- Select one of the available options (available options depend on the type of the base you have selected).



#### Selection of options:

• OPEN – the option allowing you to enter the specific database (identical to single clicking the base field).

After entering the base, you can perform the following operations (depending on the type of base):


The template of the file you create takes a form of a table whose column are separated with a <Tab> mark in order to allow direct export of the file to <Excel> sheet. # 14.6.2. Delete weighing records and reports

This field is used to clear the content of the database of weighing records and reports. After activating the function, the program will display a box with numerical keypad in which you need to enter a limit date. The date specifies the limit for data deletion – older than the date you have entered. Give a year, month and day.

The selected network and connection parameters are remembered by the balance program. Every time you turn the balance on, the program connects to the network as per your preset parameters. - Enter the desired port number and press key to confirm.

# 15.5. Virtual COM Settings

Applicable in the case of an active IM02 communication module

Virtual COM is intended for connecting the scale to a computer.

#### Steps:

- 2. Run a PC software to read measurements made with the scale.
- 3. Set communication parameters in the PC software, i.e.: COM port, transmission parameters.





- define control codes for PCL printer or receipt printer.
  - Caution: Codes must be entered in a hexadecimal form!
- define printout templates.
- \*) for port description, read section COMMUNICATION of the manual.
- \*\*) Communication ports of the scale-connected IM02 communication module.

To ensure correct balance – printer operation (correct printout of diacritical signs of a given language), respective baud rate, obligatory for a given printer, must be chosen (see the printer settings). Additionally, the code page of a sent printout must be accordant with the code page of a printer.

There are two methods for obtaining code page accordance:

by setting the right code page in printer settings (read the printer manual) – respective to the printout code page set in the balance;





The printout template is a description of how the information from the database is to be printed out. If it is insufficient, it must be modified. Correctness of the designed template can be checked by printing product-related parameters. The operation is feasible after entering <Products/Product edition> database – press the printer icon.

In <Communication> submenu, set the transmission speed that complies with the barcode scanner (by default 9600b/s). A detailed description of the communication between the balance with barcode scanners can be found in the 'ATTACHMENTS 03' of the manual.

You can configure the barcode scanner in the submenu:

'Setup / Devices / Barcode Scanner'.

## 16.3.1. Barcode scanner port

#### Procedure:

 Enter <Devices> parameters group and select <Barcode Scanner / Port>, and then set a suitable option.

The balance can communicate with the scanner via the port:

- USB

#### 16.3.2. Prefix / Suffix

The operator can edit the value of **<Prefix>** prefix and **<Suffix>** suffix in order to synchronise the weighing program with the barcode scanner.

**Note:** In the standard adopted by RADWAG, the prefix is a mark (byte) 01 hexadecimally and the suffix is a mark (byte) 0D hexadecimally. A detailed description of the communication between the balance and barcode scanners can be found in the **ATTACHMENT E** of the manual.



- After scanning the code, it will appear in ASCII and HEX fields. The test result will be displayed in the lower part of the box.

#### When:

   <Suffix> in the scanned code, the test result will be <Positive>,
- <Prefix> and <Suffix> declared in the balance settings do not comply with <Prefix> and <Suffix> in the scanned code, the test result will be <Negative>.

#### 16.4. Environmental module

It is possible to connect the THB environmental module to the balance through UDP or USB ports. In order to assure correct cooperation, you need to select a suitable environmental module connection port.

#### 16.5. IM02 communication module

The IM02 communication module allows the scale to cooperate with such accessories as printers, control keys, stack lights, buzzers, PLC controllers, as well as other control-signalling devices and PCs.



The procedure of connecting the IM02 communication module to the supply network and scale has been described in detail in the 'IM02 communication module' manual.

#### 16.5.1. Activation of IM02-to-scale connection

- Connect the IM02 communication module to the COM3 port of the scale.
- Connect the IM02 communication module to the supply network.
- Enter < Peripherals / IM02 communication module / Aktive > submenu and enable IM02 communication module ( module active, module inactive).
- Once the IM02 communication module has connected to the scale, the following information will be automatically displayed:

This menu contains global information on operation of the balance, such as language, date – time, sound signal, screen calibration, level control. To enter <Other> submenu, press the Setup key and then <Other> key.

# 18.1. Interface language selection

#### Procedure:

Enter <Other> submenu, select <Language> and choose the communication interface language of the balance.

Available languages: Polish, English, German, French, Spanish, Korean, Turkish, Chinese, Italian, Czech, Romanian, Hungarian, Russian, Serbian.

# 18.2. Date and time settings

The operator can set the date and time as well as select the data display and printout format. You can edit date and time settings in two ways:

- press <Date and time> field, available in the upper bar of the home screen,
- enter <Setup / Other/ Date and Time> submenu.

After entering the date and time settings edition box, you will see an on-screen keypad. Set relevant values: year, month, day, hour, minute and confirm changes.

#### 18.3. Extension module

The option allowing you to activate the device compliance for FDA 21 CFR procedures, extension of the communication protocol in the balance and deactivation of the standard balance license (the so-called demo balance).

To activate it, you need to know the license number for particular options. To obtain this number, you have to contact the device manufacturer.

#### Procedure:

Enter <Other> submenu, select <Extension module> parameter and follow the messages displayed.

#### 18.4. Sound

#### Procedure:

Enter <Other> submenu, select <Sound> parameter and set a relevant option:

Result approval sound — Yes/No Touch screen sound — Yes/No Sensors — Yes/No

Volume – volume range up to 100%

# 18.5. Visual result approval

The option allowing you to visually confirm that the measurement has been recorded in the weighing base. After setting < >, every recorded measurement will be communicated to the operator through temporary blue illumination of the mass display.



# 18.6. Screen saving

The operator can activate the screen saving procedure.

To do so:

Press the Setup key and then: <Other/Screen saving>.

After entering the edition box, you can select one of the following values: [None; 1; 2; 3; 5; 10; 15]. Digital values are set in minutes. Selection of one of the values causes automatic selection of this specific value and return to the previous menu.

#### Note:

The screen is saved only when the balance is not used (no changes to the mass in the screen). Return to weighing after the screen is saved occurs automatically when the program can detect any change to the mass or when you press the screen or the button on the housing.

# 18.7. Screen brightness

The screen brightness has an impact on the length of balance operating time in case of battery powering. If you wish to prolong the time between subsequent battery charging cycles as much as possible, you can reduce the screen brightness. In so doing:

Press the Setup key and then: <Other/Screen brightness>.

After entering the edition box, enter the value in the following range: [0% - 100%]. When you enter a relevant value, you instantly change the screen brightness and return to the previous menu.

#### 18.8. Vibration detection

The balance program allows detecting wrong placement of the sample on the weighing pan, which may lead to increased value errors. The function is active when the relevant icon shows up on the mass display.



If the balance program can detect wrong placement of the sample on the weighing pan, the

icon turns red - . This means that the result can be subject to a greater margin of error.

#### Procedure:

- Enter <Other> submenu.
- Select <Vibration detection> parameter,
- Select one of the options:
  - Yes active function
  - No inactive function

# 18.9. Level control

The balance is equipped with the Automatic Level Control function.

In the case of non-verified balances, you can define the method of its operation.

In the case of verified balances, settings are invisible and comply with the factory set values, that is: <Active with lock>, weighing is possible only when the balance is levelled.

#### Procedure:

- Enter <Other> submenu.
- Select <Level control> parameter and the edition box will be displayed.
- Select one of the following options:
  - None the level indicator is not displayed, the balance does not control level,
  - Active the level indicator is displayed, the balance shows the level change through a change of colour (green → OK, red → level is lost),
  - Active with lock the level indicator is displayed, the balance shows the change of the level through a change of colour (green → OK, red → level is lost; when the indicator is red, the display shows the following message – no Level -, weighing is not possible).

**Note:** The method of levelling is described in the point 13.3 of the manual.

# 18.10. Decimal point

This parameter allows you to select the decimal point in the mass printout.

# Procedure:

- Enter <Other> submenu.
- Select < Decimal point > parameter and the edition box will open.
- Select one of the following options:
  - o Dot
  - o Comma

Select the value to return to the submenu box.

# 18.11. Sensors sensitivity

This parameter ranges from 0 to 9 and determines the distance of reaction of the sensors. By default the value ranges from 5 to 7.

#### Procedure:

- Enter <Other> submenu.
- Select <Sensors sensitivity> parameter and the edition box will be displayed.
- Select one of the values. Select the value to return to the menu window.

# 18.12. Door opening

This parameter allows you to set the range of door opening in case of automatic operation. By default this value is <100%>, which means that the door is fully open.

#### Procedure:

- Enter <Other> submenu.
- Select <Door opening degree> parameter and the settings selection box will pop up.
- Select the desired value <75%>.
- Next confirm the settings to return to the menu window.

#### 18.13. Automatic ionisation

This parameter allows you to disable ionisation or select its level.

The values you can choose: None/Low/High/Continuous operation.

#### Procedure:

- Enter <Other> submenu.
- Select <Automatic ionisation> parameter and the settings selection box will pop up.
- Enter the desired value <Low>.
- Next confirm your settings to return to the menu window.

#### **18.14. Autotest**

The <AUTOTEST> function is used to help the operator evaluate work and diagnose causes of weighing errors that exceed permissible values for the specific type of balance.

AUTOTEST allows regular optimisation of the balance settings in order to obtain the best repeatability parameters and weighing time in the specific working environment. The function also lets you check the above-stated parameters at any time, as well as archive the test you have completed.

The function is divided into two modules:

AUTOTEST FILTER; AUTOTEST GLP.

Before any test is carried out, the balance checks levelling, temperature and humidity.



#### **AUTOTEST FILTER**

In this procedure, the internal weight is applied and removed 10 times for all possible filter set points and result is confirmed. 2 parameters are checked under the procedure: Repeatability and Weighing Result Stabilisation Time.

The entire test takes about 1 hour. Once the test has been conducted for all potential set points, the display shows results.

The operator is informed which settings in the specific environment are the most optimal for the balance parameters.

This function proves very useful and allows you to obtain the best possible accuracy of weighing and the shortest weighing time with the repeatability value that is accepted by the customer.

The results are remembered by the balance upon its activation.

The function allows printout through printers available in the system and quick selection of the most optimal settings directly from the options level.

After the end of the autotest, a summary and results are displayed.

The program automatically selects the filter settings by displaying a suitable icon by results:

- settings with the fastest measurement (the shortest measuring time).
- settings with the most accuracy measurement (the smallest deviation for 10 measurements).
- settings with the optimal measurement (the lowest product of time and deviation).



# Procedure:

After activating the function, the program instantly initiates the procedure and the window show up on the screen. The window informs the operator about the progress. When the autotest is finished, the program displays the summary together with current filter settings. The operator is allowed to print it out.



At any time the operator can abort the procedure by pressing <X> key in the window.

# **AUTOTEST GLP**

This test checks repeatability of applying the internal weight and determining the balance readout error with reference to its maximum loading capacity.

#### Under the procedure, the following happens:

- the internal weight is applied twice, and then this weight is applied 10 times,
- the balance is calibrated,
- the standard deviation is calculated and remembered,
- the door test is also carried out in balances with automatically opened doors.

The function also allows displaying and printing the report through printers available in the system and archiving the report which contains basic balance data, information on environmental conditions and test results.

#### Test results:

#### Procedure:

Press the field with the name and the program will display a dialogue box. From here, you can take the following actions:

- Start another AUTOTEST GLP.
- Preview autotest results and export all saved results into a \*.csv file.
- Delete all saved results.

At any time the operator can abort the procedure by pressing <X> key in the window.

The autotest results are displayed in the form of a table (every line includes date and time of the autotest and results).

To display the autotest data, press a specific line of the table with results.

To print out results of the single autotest, enter the results with all data on the autotest, and generate the content printout by pressing <Printout> key in the upper bar of the display. The results can be exported by pressing an export field in the window with all saved autotests. The data will be sent to the external memory (pendrive) as a \*.csv file.

# 18.15. Start-up logo

(The option is available to the authorised operator only).

This parameter allows you to change the image showed in the screen while launching the device system.

# 18.16. System events export

(The option is available to the authorised operator only).

This option allows you to generate a special file which is saved automatically, after you run the option, to the external memory (pendrive) inserted in the USB port. This file is used to diagnose potential problems related to operation of the device by RADWAG service technicians

#### Procedure:

- Insert the pendrive memory stick into the USB port.
- Next enter <Other> submenu.
- Select <System events export> parameter.
- The program will generate a special file and save it automatically on the pendrive stick.
- Such a file must be sent to RADWAG.

# 18.17. Text-to-speech conversion

This parameter allows you to convert names of particular groups and menu parameters into speech emitted from the measuring head speakers.

The voice that is emitted is available in English only.

#### 19. SCHEDULED TASKS

This menu contains settings that allow you to schedule recurring tasks, such as balance calibration or display of a special message.

#### 19.1. Balance calibration





<Scheduled calibrations> parameter lets you declare the exact time and interval for call of balance calibration. This option is independent of automatic calibration and call criteria (time, temperature). You can schedule the internal and external calibration. To make sure the external calibrations are scheduled, you can also export standard weights to the balance memory and use them for the purposes of calibration.

# Setting:

Before you schedule the calibration, you need to enter standard weights together with their data for external calibrations.

To do so, enter the operator's menu, and <Calibration> parameters group and find <Calibration weights> and enter the weight by giving its data:










## 21. UPDATE

It contains the following module which you can use to update the following:

- The field related to the operator: APPLICATION.
- Motherboard (administrator only).

The update is automatic and involves collection of the information from the USB external memory.

- Prepare a USB flash drive with the update file. Required file extension: \*.lab4.
- Connect the USB flash drive to the USB port of the indicator.
- Log in as the Administrator.
- Press button to enter the balance menu.
- Select <Update> option
- Select < Application > field.


